EARTHQUAKES IN NEW YORK

Seismic Disturbances Which Have Shook the Empire State in Years Past

New York has had four earthquake shocks in the past 10 years.

The first of the four was in October, 1870. It was a rather strong, gentle vibration which was felt throughout the state. The surface of the ground was cracked, and practically the same at all points within a considerable radius of New York city. At no place was it severe enough to do any damage, states the World.

The greatest shock ever known in New York was in August 1884. This was particularly remarkable on account of the large area influenced. The shock was felt simultaneously for 500 miles from the coast, and for a thousand miles north and south along it.

William A. Eddy, who made a careful study of the disturbance, took 259 time observations, and, calculating on the time that was required for the vibrations to reach various points, he claimed that the center of the disturbance was about 300 miles below the earth's surface, and almost directly above Long Island.

The famous Charleston earthquake, which killed 40 people, was felt in New York. This was on August 22, 1886, and the shock was felt in New York and throughout the region south of it on the same day. It was not strong here, but was of enough force to be plainly perceptible to everyone.

The last shock felt in New York was that of an hour after midnight on March 8, 1893. The disturbance was entirely local, though it was felt on Long Island. The greatest vibration was between Tenth and Eighteenth streets, but it was plainly felt throughout the city. Many people were awakened, the animals in the Central Zoo were greatly alarmed and expressed their fright in wild cries, billiard games throughout the city were stopped by the sudden unaccountable movement of the balls, and water was spilled from glasses on the tables of some of the restaurants. The movement lasted about five seconds.

Since 1893 there must have been many earth movements, but were not strong enough to be observed without instruments. The seismic graph of William A. Eddy, at Bayport, N. Y., recorded quite a strong vibration on March 22 of this year, when there were disturbances in Mexico, and in the three weeks preceding that four series of vibrations were recorded on the smoked glass plate that hangs under the pendulum.

The Martinique outbreak, however, appears to have been more superficial and explosive in character, as no vibrations were recorded on the instrument.

Shocks have been felt at other times in other parts of the Atlantic seaboard and some have influenced other parts of New York state.
