Morrow county is coming to the front.

It is now asserted that King Edward's recovery is complete.

From the wheat districts reports are coming in that wheat is turning out better than was expected. Yields are heavy and the quality is No. 1.

Morrow county farmers will have plenty of money this fall. The wheat crop is estimated at 1,000,000 bushels. Prices are good which makes an encouraging outlook.

Col. Henry E. Dorsch will start for Japan about September 1, to make arrangements for an Oregon exhibit at the Osaka Exposition in 1903. Mr. Dorsch can accomplish much at this exposition. Our trade relations with Japan should be more intimate.

The Elgin Creamery Co. which operated 135 creameries throughout Illinois, Iowa and Wisconsin has failed. There are 10,000 creditors, 8,000 of them being farmers who supplied cream. The concern was the largest of its kind in the United States.

A New York electrician comes out with the statement that murderers sentenced to die in the electric chair, are frequently not killed by the electric current, and that many people who are supposed to have been electrocuted are in reality buried alive. This ought to have a good effect on murderers.

The \$120,000,000 harvester trust has issued letters to their general agents throughout the country, ordering a reduction of three fourths of the number of employees representing the different companies in the field. Ten thousand men will lose their positions. If this is only a starter, what will be the result in time, and still the people wonder at strikes.

The O. R. & N. is making some substantial improvements on the Heppner branch. The company will put the branch in condition to meet the requirements of the increasing business. For some time work trains have been engaged in bridge work. During the past week a train has been distributing heavy steel rails and the line will be furnished with new steel the entire length. Improvement of transportation facilities will be a great help to Morrow county interests.

The spring fishing season on the Columbia river closed Friday night. That artificial propagation is a success has been proven beyond a doubt. It is now a recognized fact that the runs of salmon in the river can be limited only by the number of artificially propagated fry that are turned out from the hatcheries. This eliminates the possibility of the industry ever becoming extinct on the Columbia if proper and intelligent attention is paid to it. Canneries have packed approximately 339,000 cases of the spring run of salmon, while the cold storage plants have received fish enough to fill 87,000 cases, making the total product 426,000 cases. The run was one of the best in recent years, and 25 per cent greater than in 1901. The average price was 5 cents, and fishermen alone received nearly \$1,000,000.

AN ACTIVE WOOL SEASON

The bulk of the wool clip of the United States for 1902 has now passed out of the hands of growers and is in the control of the eastern trade. It has been a successful season, as far as the grower is concerned, and he has been able to market his clip at an average advance of fully two cents per pound over the prices ruling last year. On some of the early shorn wools the advance realized was only about one cent, but on many of the later shorn wools, the advance was considerably more than two cents. Eastern dealers have been eager buyers of the clips, and most of

the wools have been taken about as rapidly as they have been shown. In some of the fleece wool sections east of the Mississippi river, wools have in some instances been held at prices far above the ideas of buyers, but as a whole the clip of the country has seldom, if ever, been so rapidly cleaned up as the American Wool and Cotton Reporter. Today very few shaggy clips of unsold wool can be found in the hands of their original owners west of the Mississippi.

The cause of this eager and rapid buying of the new wools, it is not difficult to discover. Stocks of old wools, which for some years had been hanging over the domestic markets, have practically disappeared. Importations of clothing wools have been absorbed by consumers and the supplies of foreign wools in the United States are today very small. The rapid advance in the price of wool abroad has tended naturally to check importations, and consumers have resorted more freely than usual to the domestic stock. In view of the extended curtailment in the wool clip of Australia caused by the excessive droughts there, the situation abroad, as far as wool is concerned, is very strong, and all indications point to very firm prices for wool during the remainder of the year. With wools abroad higher and indications that supplies, especially of fine wools, will be small for months to come, it is not to be wondered at that the eastern dealers have been willing to pay higher prices than they were last year, and that the markets at the seaboard have advanced.
