Fall trade is beginning to open up and activity in business circles is apparent.

Old Maine has rolled up a Republican majority of 27,000. This is 12,000 above the usual plurality.

The Oregonian figures the wheat yield of the Pacific Northwest for 1902 at 41,685,000 bushels, being for Oregon 12,785,000, Washington 24,900,000 and Idaho 4,000,000.

W. J. Furnish of Pendleton is very much opposed to the creation of the Blue Mountain forest reserve. He says that settlers who have gone into the mountain valleys and are alarmed over the prospects of the reserve. He is of the opinion that the livestock industry would be injured if this reserve is created.

President Roosevelt is now an honorary member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen. In a speech at Chattanooga, Tenn., he expressed himself in a manner that was well understood that he was a firm believer in organized labor. Roosevelt is a grand man and an American of which the people are proud.

For the development of the Morrow county coal fields Messrs. D. A. Herren, Geo. Conser and C. E. Redfield deserve great credit. They have spent thousands of dollars when a great many people thought the investment was foolish and now their keen judgement and foresight can be realized. It is a case where enterprise, push and grit will be well rewarded.

Secretary R. F. Hynd of the Oregon Wool Growers Association is urging woolgrowers to attend the annual meeting of the Association to be held at Pendleton on Tuesday, September 16. The wool growers of Eastern Oregon have been benefitted by this organization since the inauguration of the sealed bid method of selling wool. There should be a good attendance at the Pendleton meeting. The wool growers should protect their interests.

The Democrats are as silent about the trusts these days as they are about imperialism and militarism. The campaign which the Republicans are waging against them has taken the combine question out of politics. Everybody knows that the administration is in earnest in its suits against the trusts which are now before the courts. If the law is found, in the case against the railroad merger or the beef trust, to be inadequate, new legislation will be had. The Republicans are in the trust fight to win.—Ex.

No action has yet been taken in relation to the proposed Blue Mountain forest reserve. In speaking of the matter recently, Hon. Binger Herman, commissioner of the general land office said: "The tract has merely been withdrawn from settlement and whether a reserve will be created, and, if so, upon what lines, remains to be determined. Concerning the effect the creation of the reserve would have upon the grazing war in Eastern Oregon, I can say nothing, except in a general way, that the department is friendly to the grazing interests,

and the regulations have met the approval of the sheep and cattle-men. This would seem to be a demonstration of the beneficial influence of the forestry regulations. The department is liberal in granting grazing privileges except where is found that grazing injures the tree growth or interferes with the waterflow.

WE UNDERSTAND.

This is the dull season with the European press, and this year it is duller than usual. Hence all this thrashing over of old straw about the Monroe Doctrine. Hence the special bitterness of the fulminations of the London Saturday Review and other journals with which hatred of America is a staple of trade.

However, the London Spectator, which is not unfriendly to the United States, directs attention to a point which it behooves Americans never to forget—a point on which the action of any and every European power may be predicted with absolute certainty should Europe's self-interest happen to coincide in time with our negligence.

"The power on which it must primarily rest," says the Spectator of the Monroe Doctrine, "is sea power. If the European states know America has sea power enough to enforce the Monroe Doctrine, it will be scrupulously respected. The moment they see the doctrine is based only on paper it will be disregarded."

Exactly. Every thinking American understands that European respect for the Monroe Doctrine rests on European fear of the power of the United States. The President declared that understanding clearly, in the speech which the European press is now discussing when he said:

"In the world as it is, the nation

which advances a given doctrine likely to interfere in any way with other nations must possess the power to back it up if it wishes the doctrine to be respected."

Precisely. That is what every thinking American understands. That is why every thinking American favors the steady upbuilding of the navy. For the navy is the power that maintains that wholesome fear in Europe, and compels the continuance of respect for the Monroe Doctrine.—Inter Ocean.
