BIG SALE OF CATTLE.

650 Feeders Were Purchased by Heppner Yesterday.

O. F. Thompson, Asa Thompson, Shirley Thompson, and Harry Rogers, of Butter Creek, were in the city yesterday to weigh in and receive cattle that have been purchased for winter feeding.

The Penland Livestock company brought in 200 head; Thos. McCullough sold 130 head, Price Florence furnished 40 head, and Wes and Tom Marlatt brought in about 40 head. Alex Sweek of Long Creek and Rock Creek parties drove in a bunch of steers. Thos. Matlock of this city sold about 40 head.

The price paid was \$3.50 per hundred.

Messrs. O. F. Thomson and sons Asa and Harry will feed 1000 head this winter.

Immense crops of alfalfa are grown along the fertile bottoms of Butter Creek, and thousands of head of cattle are fattened for market which brings a good return of profit to the Butter Creek farmers.
