Boers and Chamberlain.

LONDON, Sept. 5.—A conference between the Boer Generals Botha, Dewet and Delarey, and Colonial Secretary Chamberlain was held today in Downing street. They received a hearty welcome from the considerable crowds assembled at either end of the route. The Boers wore immaculate frock coats and silk hats, and repeatedly doffed the latter in response to the cheers. Just prior to the Generals' departure from their hotel, Abram Fisher, the Boer delegate, had a conference with them. Lord Kitchener and Lord Onslow, Under-Secretary of State for the Colonies, participated in the conference. Two stenographers were present at the conference, which lasted two hours. Mr. Chamberlain has authorized the announcement that the proceedings of the interview will be published in a blue book later.

RANGE CROWDED.

Shortage in Number Fed in Middle West the Cause.

A great deal has been said recently about the overcrowded conditions of the ranges of Eastern Oregon and the matter has really become a serious problem. Umatilla county stockmen are not so badly worked up over the matter as are the stockmen of Grant and Malheur, but it is also a matter that is worrying the stockmen of this immediate section.

Something must be accomplished soon or the ranges will all be so crowded that stockmen will suffer.

In speaking of the matter a prominent sheepman, of Pendleton, said yesterday:

"The range question is really becoming alarming. There is no getting around the fact that the ranges are overcrowded even in Umatilla county, and it is worse in Malheur and Grant counties. However, I look for a thinning out of the surplus this fall and winter and do not anticipate that there will be so many stock ranged next year. One reason for the overcrowding this season is the fact that fewer cattle and sheep were shipped out last year than usual. Crops around the Middle West feeding centers were short and consequently the large feeders could not buy and feed through the winter at a profit, so more stock was left on the range. They could have been sold last spring, but those having cattle or sheep after having to winter them did not dare to sell, thinking they could profit by keeping them through the summer from the growth and increase."

"So far stock are in good shape, but they are beginning to feel the result of the overcrowded condition. Grass is getting very short, especially in places. Stockmen look for an early fall, though, and if it comes with plenty of moisture the early range will be good and notwithstanding the crowding all will fare comparatively well. The past summer has been an ideal one for the stockmen. The spring was late and damp and grass was kept green until late. Had it not been for this there would have been some bad results from the shortage of range."

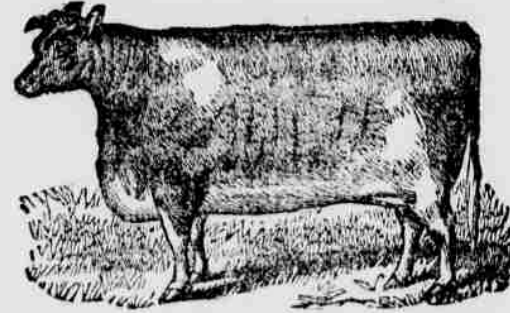
