### STONE WORK ON NEW BUILDING NEARING COMPLETION.

### Two New Citizens--Assessor Working on Assessment Roll--Real Estate Transfers.

Stone work on the main building of the new court house will be finished next week. The work on the tower will be done while the roof is being put on. A big slab of finishing stone for the name plate was received Tuesday. It is ten feet long, three feet wide and eight inches thick.

#### IN THE CLERK'S OFFICE.

Eric Lindgren, a native of Sweden has made formal declaration before the county clerk of his intention to become a citizen of the United States.

Patrick McNamee has also declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States, by filing his first papers.

H. W. Westland and Louis Kinney have filed notice of location of a mining claim, known as the Little Lora claim, situated one mile east of the old Hamlet mill on the north slope of Black Mountain.

#### AT SHERIFF'S OFFICE.

Sheriff E. M. Shutt is working on the tax list which will become delinquent on the first Monday in October. This list is comprised of parties who under the provisions of the law, paid half the amount of their taxes before the first Monday in April.

Taxpayers should remember that a penalty of 10 per cent and interest of 12 per cent will be charged from the first Monday in April if allowed to become delinquent after the first Monday in October, under the requirements of this unsatisfactory law.

#### RETURN FROM ENGLAND.

### Mr. and Mrs. Bayley Back From Trip Across Atlantic.

Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Bayley, of John Day, are in the city. They are the guests of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Rhea, the latter being a sister of Mrs. Bayley. Mr. Bayley is of the well known firm of McCullum & Bayley, of John Day.

Mr. and Mrs. Bayley have been making an extended visit to Mr. Bayley's old home near London, England.

They have been gone since the first of June, this being Mr. Bayley's first visit after an absence of 22 years.

In speaking of the trip Mr. Bayley said:

"Our trip was very pleasant. English methods are interesting to me now. When I told some of the people that they were about one hundred years behind the times, they almost got mad at me.

"You do not see the rush and rustle there that you find here. The influence of American enterprise and capital is being felt in England today, and they are beginning to realize that the United States is a great country.

"People in England do not injure themselves by overwork. I watched some of the farming operations with interest and amusement. At one place I saw four men hauling in hay. They were using a little one horse cart. Two men were up in the cart loading. They did not use a pitchfork, but spread the hay around with their hands. The other two men were pitching on the hay and they were in no hurry about getting

on a load.

"Another place plowing was going on. Two horses were hitched to the plow, in tandem. One man was holding the plow and two more men were leading the horses.

"I am very glad to get back home again and am satisfied with Eastern Oregon."

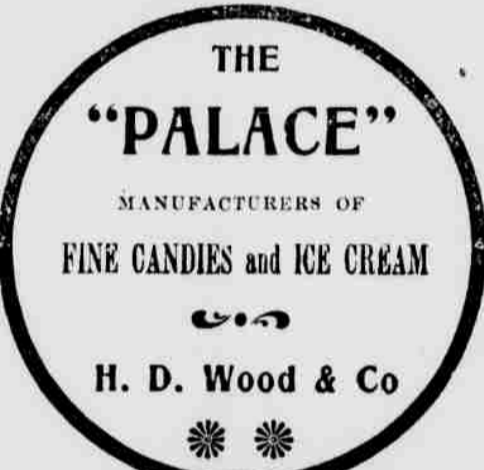
