THE DALLES LAND OFFICE.

Heaviest Quarter's Work in the History of the Office.

The statement of business for the quarter ended September 30, 1902, at The Dalles land office is as follows:

Three hundred twenty-three homestead entries, 18 original desert land entries; 23 excess homesteads; 1 mineral land entry; 1 coal declaratory statement; 1 adverse mining claim; 1 Dalles Military Wagon Road Co. List; 1 amended state desert land selection; 23 sales of isolated tracts. Thus 53,959.10 acres have been appropriated from the public domain.

Final proof was made on fifty-one homesteads, eight timber-culture entries, one pre-emption, two desert land entries, one commuted timber-culture entry, 92 commuted homesteads and 165 timber and stone claims.

Number of acres on which final proof was offered 49,203.96.

Total number acres sold 44,578.79, amounting to \$85,439.16.

Received from testimony fees \$410.08, making the total fees and commissions \$7,408.06.

The receipts of the office in fees and commissions and sales of public lands amounted to \$92,838.22, being \$7,481.82 over maximum for one quarter alone.

During the three months 573 timber and stone sworn statements were filed; 32 contests initiated and over 200 applications of various kinds rejected and suspended.

This is the heaviest quarter's work in the history of the office, the months during which lands forfeited by the Northern Pacific Railway Co. were being purchased from the government not excepted, and is largely due to the rush for timber lands lying in Crook county which began early in January, the time for payment after due publication having arrived.

During the first thirteen days of October, 96 homesteads have been filed and 134 timber and stone applications.

OUTLOOK FOR SHEEP.

Local Market is Very Dull—Few Sales Made.

The local sheep market is very dull. Owing to a dry season and conditions in Idaho brought about by the law prohibiting the running of sheep near inhabited dwellings the Eastern demand is being supplied from points outside of Oregon.

The main bulk of feeders which are being purchased for the corn belt are being obtained in Colorado, Utah, Montana and Idaho.

This condition is being felt in Eastern Oregon. There is the usual surplus and with the short ranges, owners are showing a tendency to sell, but the market is in an unsatisfactory condition.

Wyoming has experienced a very dry season, which has left the range in a deplorable condition for winter feeding. Sheep men realize that with the overcrowded conditions existing, there is small chance of wintering their flocks without serious losses. They are therefore reducing their holdings considerably. In Fremont, Natrona, Big Horn and Johnson counties, feed is very short and many of the larger outfits in these places are planning to cut their holdings fully 50 per cent, says the American Wool and Cotton Reporter. Great difficulty is being experienced in making shipments, the railroads being unable to supply cars fast enough to take care of their orders. At all points along the line they are hundreds of cars behind, which means a delay of several weeks to sheep men who have in many cases trailed their sheep long distances to the shipping point, only to be obliged to turn back again to feed on the dry, sandy prairie, and wait their turn for cars. The heavy shrinkage from this delay, and the long trip to market, means a considerable loss, but there seems to be no remedy for it.

Following local sheep sales for the week are reported:

McKnight Bros. to Jeff Jones, 2000 wether lambs, at \$1.50 per head. This is about an average price for wethers.

Smythe & Son, of Arlington, purchased 600 yearling ewes of Harry Cummings for \$2.50 per head.

Eighty thousand bushels of wheat grown on the ranch of Charles Pickard, near Walla Walla, were sold Saturday at 60 cents a bushel. This is the highest figure paid in the Walla Walla country for wheat since the days of the Leiter "corner" in 1898.
