Potato Pie.

Slice eight or nine boiled potatoes. Put two tablespoonfuls of white (not cream) sauce in a stewpan with four ounces of butter, two ounces of grated cheese, juice of half a lemon, seasoning of salt, pepper and nutmeg and the yolks of four well-beaten eggs. Stir over the fire until thoroughly heated. Place a row of croutons of fried or toasted bread around a shallow baking dish, put a layer of the potato slices within the border and cover with some of the sauce, then arrange another layer of potatoes in a smaller circle and cover with sauce, and so on until you have formed a raised center; put a little sauce on top and cover with two ounces more of grated cheese and some bread crumbs and bake about 20 minutes until nicely browned and serve up hot.—Washington Star.

A Custard Hint.

When baking a custard in an oven containing some other dish which requires greater heat, the proper temperature may be obtained by setting the custard in a pan of hot water. Do not allow the water to boil around it. If it shows a symptom of bubbling, add cold water. Use a pan a bit larger than the dish containing the custard, and do not put in water enough to come more than half way up the pudding dish. This permits more water to be added without dipping any out, and also lifting out the custard as soon as it is cooked. If left standing even a few minutes in the hot water it will whey.—Good Housekeeping.
