In the matter of change in county road No. 38.

The petition of W. T. Dutton et al. was again taken up for the purpose of appointing appraisers to view the road with the surveyor. On account of former viewers having failed to comply with the law, following viewers were appointed: F. M. Gentry, W. G. Scott and Ed Duran, to meet on the 22d day of November at 10 o'clock a. m. at the beginning of the proposed road.

In the matter of appointing a county physician for one year. Dr. Frank B. Kistner was appointed county physician and to receive salary of \$70.

R. C. Wills, contractor for interior finish on the new court house was allowed \$2000, this amount being due.

In accordance with the contract Frank DuPrat was allowed \$2000 for stone work on new court house.

The clerk's statement in relation to payment of scalp bounty claims was accepted and approved by the court.

The sum of \$375 was allowed Gilliam & Bisbee for plumbing work on new court house.
