Funeral services were conducted at the Masonic cemetery near this city, Saturday at 11 o'clock, Rev. F. C. Adkins officiating.

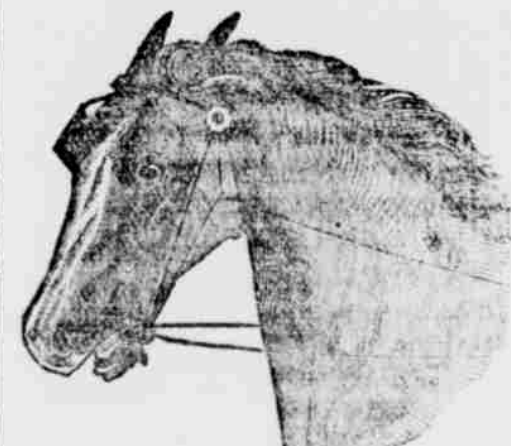
A large number of people witnessed the last sad rites.
