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TEACHERS' MEETING

THE ANNUAL INSTITUTE WAS WELL ATTENDED.

Much Interest was Shown in the Discussion of Educational Matters.

The Morrow County Teachers' Annual Institute closed Friday evening, after a most interesting meeting, from which good results will follow, from the exchange of views and discussion of modern educational methods.

The labor was lightened by entertainment in the evening.

On Thursday evening, a number of the teachers were entertained by Mrs. J. W. Shipley, and the teachers speak very highly of Mrs. Shipley as an entertainer.

Following are the proceedings of the Institute as they appeared to a teacher and special representative of the GAZETTE.

The house was called to order by Supt. Shipley, who introduced to the Institute J. H. Ackerman, Superintendent of Public Instruction, who gave an excellent address and interpretation of the State Course of Study, taking all care possible to present the subject in a way that the teacher or pupil present might know just how to rightly divide the different departments. Certainly every teacher present can properly apply the work.

Methods were next discussed by President E. D. Ressler, of the Monmouth Normal School. The manner in which the President handled his subject, showed very clearly that he had given it proper thought, as he made it so plain to teachers that they were able to solve the meaning of all his logic, as he demanded. He carried the teachers through a drill exercise which is bound to result in good to all present.

The subject of Arithmetic came next, conducted by the State Superintendent.

After explaining quite a number of successful ways in which the several rules may be taught, he drilled the class in some written and oral work, to the satisfaction of all the teachers. There are but few educators who carry with them the great force of character that you will readily see in our deserving leader.

School Government came next, in which the whole session got very much enthused, Messrs. Conklin and Reid, being the champions. The temperature of the room soon rose to blood heat, but by chance, a cool wave evened up the feelings, with no serious damage. In regard to this, most any of us ought to be able to subdue that stubborn nature which exists in some children, yet we all employ different means.

For Physiology, the Institute discussed the subjects of Ventilation and Cleanliness, both subjects being handled to the satisfaction of all present. Those who could not get the stove placed in the right position, decided to move the house to suit the stove. Some people have queer ideas. One fellow said he didn't think once a year was any too often to take a bath; certainly he never stepped to count the wear and tear of towels and the waste of water.

Reading was conducted by E. D. Ressler, who got his class very much interested on the all-important subject. It is a very much looked-over study in most schools.

It is very necessary that we teach

reading carefully, that, when our pupils reach a grade where knowledge subjects are to be read, they may be able to get all it means. Cultivate the thinking part; don't allow your pupils to just merely get over the lesson, only to forget what they have read. Ordinarily, we have four classes of readers as follows, Employ present time; to Train the voice; Ridiculous or funny things, and to gain the desired information. What we want, is to impress upon the pupils minds the great necessity of learning to rightly divide these different reading matters.

When I get to be manager of the reading matter, I will simplify History, Physiology, Geography and Civil Government, so that the beginner can get the right idea at first, together with the lives of great men.

Owing to the illness of President J. M. Martindale, quite a number of subjects were omitted.

One of the most interesting and also entertaining parts connected with the Institute was the Male Quartette. It should be with pride that our county teachers boast of being able to not only teach the lads how to shoot new ideas, but, also, to go upon the stage and play the part of comedians.

Superintendent Shipley and wife, entertained a party of Institute friends, in their home, Thursday evening. Refreshments were served and a general good time was the result.

There were other important subjects discussed, from which it is hoped much good will result.

It only remains now, to speak of the closing scene, which occurred Friday evening, at the Christian church. An artistic program of music, was rendered by Heppner talent, which was received with great response of cheers, followed by President Ressler, who gave excellent advice to the teacher, and also to others who are interested in the cause of education. He is a great man in the cause, and said some brilliant and thy things on this line.

Crisman Found Guilty.

The trial of John A. Crisman for the killing of William Johnson ended when the jury filed into the circuit court room Friday morning at 10 o'clock, and handed Judge Clifford a verdict of manslaughter, says the Blue Mountain Eagle. It was a moment of intense interest. The jury had been out since 5 o'clock Thursday evening, and every one present was anxiously awaiting the verdict, whatever it might be. The prisoner looked worn and haggard, as though he had passed a sleepless night, and when he heard the words that meant to him incarceration in the state penitentiary, he looked the picture of despair. His counsel, Attorneys Parrish, Dustin and Cozad, had fought hard for him as he knew, but with all their knowledge of the law and their eloquence, they could not overcome the array of evidence brought by the state. The district attorney, William Miller, and Stephen A. Lowell, of Pendleton, who assisted in the prosecution, were at all times vigilant and active in the interest of the state, and have received many compliments for their skillful handling of the case. About 70 witnesses were examined, the majority being for the defense. The trial will cost Grant county in the neighborhood of \$5000.

Crisman was sentenced, Saturday, to serve twelve years in the penitentiary.
