The railroads going into Portland have subscribed \$50,000 to the Lewis and Clark fair fund. With the substantial encouragement received the fair ought to be a great success.

America has lost a great man in the death of Thomas B. Reed. A man of strong convictions, aggressive and outspoken, Reed could not be president, for he antagonized the political powers. His great intellect was a power in congress.

The fact that W. O. Minor's yearling Shorthorn bull, Rolando, bred in Morrow county, took first prize and topped the sale, at the International Fat Stock Show in Chicago, is an honor of no small importance. This fine young animal was in competition with the United States, Canada and England, and won out first on merit, which proves not only that Mr. Minor has some of the finest cattle in the world, but that Morrow county is one of the most favored places for fine stock breeding.

The first gun for irrigation in Eastern Oregon, will be fired at Pendleton, in a public meeting to be held on December 13. Morrow county ought to have a representative at this meeting. With a 100,000 acres of arid lands, capable of great production with the application of water, Morrow county people ought to become interested in the great irrigation question. A meeting should be arranged for here so that the people could get together and discuss this great question.

The near approach of the next Oregon legislature makes the senatorial question an absorbing topic just now. A Salem paper remarks if the editors only had the casting of the vote, Charley Fulton would be elected on the first ballot. Of all the candidates, the GAZETTE is of the opinion that Mr. Fulton is the choice of a great majority of the people all over the state. Scott, Geer, Simon, McGinn and many others would not keep in sight of Fulton in a race submitted to the people by popular vote. Fulton is popular because he is a good man, and could probably do more in the United States Senate for Oregon, than any of the candidates mentioned. Mr. Fulton's pleasant address, undoubted ability and force of oratory, has made him many friends who would be pleased to see him represent Oregon in the upper house at Washington.
