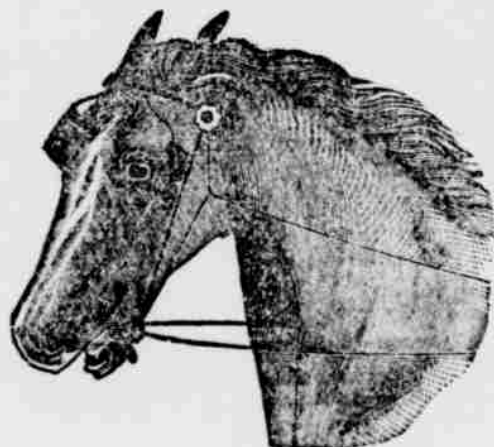

MIGHT CULMINATE IN WAR

As a Result of Maintaining the
Monroe Doctrine.

SENATOR BACON'S OPINION

Thinks This the Utter Purpose
of the Allied Powers in
Attacking VenezuelaWashington, Dec. 22.—Senator Bacon,
of Georgia, member of the committee
on foreign relations, thinks that the
United States has reached a point where
the Monroe Doctrine must either be
abandoned or fight for it. After de-
scribing the various conditions, he says
the last is the only course, as it will
never be changed or abandoned.He thinks Germany and Great Britain
have had an ulterior purpose in their
attack upon Venezuela, and that it
means an infringement upon the Monroe
Doctrine, while the view of seeing how
far the United States will allow them to
go. While the present difficulty may
not result in war, when the time comes
for the next step of a similar character,
the European powers will be more
aggressive and will infringe upon the
Monroe Doctrine to a still greater ex-
tent, and then force the United States
to act. The Georgia Senator adds:"I am satisfied that Senators generally,
regardless of political opinions, have
restrained themselves from expressions
upon this question because they recog-
nize that it is grave, and that they
have not wished to add to the difficulties
of the situation by an intemperate
speech. This silence, perhaps, has been
misunderstood abroad. Our silence has
not been by any means in the nature of
acquiescence."Every one recognizes the right of a
government to collect its debts from an-
other government, but in this case it
appears to me that Great Britain and
Germany have gone too far."

May Not Accept.

Washington, Dec. 22.—President
Roosevelt has not accepted the position
of arbitrator of the Venezuela contro-
versy. In fact, when the official day
closed he had not received formally or
officially a request from the European
powers that he act as arbitrator of the
dispute. These statements are made on
the highest authority.In an informal manner the President
has been notified that the European
powers intimately concerned in the
present South American difficulty desire
that he should undertake the respon-
sibility of acting as arbitrator of the
points at issue between them and
Venezuela. Thus far they merely have
been "taking soundings," with a view,
probably, of ascertaining how he would
receive a formal proffer to act as
arbitrator. The President, as soon as
he received the first intimation that
he was desired to be arbitrator of the
Venezuelan controversy, expressed
emphatically his judgment that the
matters to be arbitrated should be
referred to The Hague tribunal. His
views of the suggestions made have
been conveyed to the European powers,
together with a strong presentation for
the view he holds. No response of a
formal nature to these representations
has been received.

Will Visit Reserve.

Baker City, Dec. 19.—Congressman-
elect J. N. Williamson is here, on his
way to Canyon City to investigate and
ascertain the true state of affairs in re-
gard to the proposed Blue Mountain
forest reserve. A number of prominent
mining men and other citizens who are
opposed to the reserve met Mr. William-
son here this evening and explained
their objection to the proposed reserve,
submitting maps, facts and figures to
sustain their contention. Mr. William-
son said that at the present time he had
no opinion to express in regard to the
reserve, his purpose being to learn what
the residents of this section most di-
rectly concerned had to say. He listen-
ed during the afternoon to several

advocates of the proposition to establish
the reserve.Speaking of the recent discussion of
the alleged land frauds in this state,
Mr. Williamson said that in his opinion
it was not wise to discuss such ques-
tions, because he did not believe that
the facts warranted the belief that such
wholesale frauds had been perpetrated
as some of the Government officials
and the press intimate. He approved,
however, of the exposure of the recent at-
tempt to work through the school land
grant in Baker and Malheur Coun-
ties, which was exposed by The
Oregonian in November. The Con-
gressman-elect has nothing to say in
regard to irrigation or the United States
Senatorship. He fought shy of both
subjects.

WILL BE NEUTRAL.

United States Will Recognize War
Blockade.Washington, Dec. 18.—The United
States will recognize the war blockade
of the Venezuela coast, which will take
effect tomorrow, and will give notice of
neutrality.In the meantime Minister Bowen will
proceed with peace negotiations, with
which the blockade will not interfere.
The allies talk of asking the United
States to guarantee the paying of any
sum which the arbitrators may declare
due to them from Venezuela, but the
Government will refuse to thus go on
Castro's bond.France has notified Secretary Hay
that it claims priority for the payment
of sums due its citizens for damage
suffered prior to Castro's accession, and
equal treatment with the other powers
regarding all other powers.Germany has notified the United
States that an apology is due from Ven-
ezuela for the mobbing of her legation
at Caracas and the terrorizing of her
Minister's sick wife. She claims this
apology must be given before terms
of peace can be considered.The best ships of Admiral Dewey's
fleet will be stationed during the holi-
days at Trinidad, which is close to the
Venezuelan coast.

Forest Officers Report Adversely.

Salem, Ore., Dec. 18.—Capt. S. B.
Ormsby has returned from The Dalles
where he has been for the past eight
days, representing the Forestry De-
partment is some 14 land contests.
These contests included land added to
the forests reserve in Eastern Oregon
by the president's proclamation issued
on July 1, 1901. Superintendent Ormsby
and Supervisor Dufur were ordered to
make an investigation of the improve-
ments and to ascertain if the entrymen
had complied with the law up to the
date of the proclamation. These four-
teen claims were reported adversely by
the forest officers. The entrymen de-
manded a hearing at the land office,
which was held during the last eight
days. The matter will be first decided
by the local land office at The Dalles,
then it goes to the commissioner of the
general land office for his decision.
