WANTS MORE BATTLESHIPS
We Must be Prepared to Meet European Nations.
SO SAYS SENATOR ELKINS
West Virginia Senator Would Start Every Arsenal and Gun Factory in the Country.
Washington, Dec. 28.—Senator Elkins, of West Virginia, is one of the men who does not agree with Senator Hale, but wants a larger increase in the navy. In connection with the Venezuelan situation and the position of the United States he said:
"We should build 50 more battleships before we talk about paring down naval appropriations. We should make liberal provision for four or more new battleships at the present session, and if I understand the sentiment among the members of the Senate we are going to get a substantial increase. I do not wish to pose as an alarmist nor do I pretend to be familiar with all the diplomatic and court intrigues of Europe. As a practical business man, however, I know that Germany is a bold, aggressive and progressive nation. Germany believes in expansion of territory, as well as broadening her commerce, and she has built a large navy and maintains a large standing army to look after her interests in all parts of the world. Germany is striving to extend her commerce in every direction and her enterprising navy is bound to clash with the United States and other nations who compete with her for the world's commerce. Germany has a big army and a big navy and it is great temptation for her to use one or both whenever she thinks her rights are being affected or restrained. Germany is a fighting nation, as her record shows, and she is always prepared for any emergency that may arise."
"Now it is idle for us to close our eyes to the possibility that we may sooner or later become involved in a war with one of the great powers of Europe as the result of our new policy of territorial expansion. We might as well look the situation squarely in the face and be prepared to defend our interests and assert our rights in all parts of the world. I am not only in favor of making provision for several additional battleships at the present session, but I am also in favor of making an appropriation for starting up work in every arsenal and gun factory in this country. What we need in addition to fighting ships is a new supply of small arms for

HEPPNER WOOLGROWERS' ASSOCIATION ORGANIZED.
Sheepmen of Morrow County form Local Organization With 30 Members to Start With.
A number of prominent sheep men of Morrow county met at the Palace hotel on Friday, the 23d inst, to take steps for the organization of a local association.
The meeting was for the purpose of getting the sentiment of the woolgrowers in relation to local organization and the matter was kept quiet until it was ascertained that a great majority of the sheep growers are in favor of the proposition.
The meeting resulted in local organization with the following officers:
A. Andrews, president; F. P. Farnsworth, vice-president; D. O. Justus, secretary-treasurer.
The organization will be known as the Heppner Woolgrowers' Association.
Secretary Gwynn, of the Oregon Woolgrowers' Association was present and addressed the meeting, giving some valuable advice and information.
The Heppner Woolgrowers' Association will hold a regular meeting in this city on January 20, 1903, when it is expected that there will be a good representation of the sheepmen tributary to Heppner present.
A committee consisting of R. F. Hynd, A. Andrews and D. O. Justus was appointed to draft resolutions to be submitted at the next regular meeting.
As there are about 150 woolgrowers tributary to Heppner, the Heppner Woolgrowers' Association will probably be a strong organization. The membership fee is \$3.
The following circular has been mailed to the different sheepmen in Morrow, Grant and Wheeler counties, tributary to Heppner:

Heppner, Ore., Dec 26, 1902.
Dear Sir—A meeting of woolgrowers was held in Heppner on Dec. 23, 1902, and a branch of the Oregon State Woolgrowers Association, known as the Heppner Woolgrowers' Association, was organized.
There never has been a time in the history of the sheep industry in Eastern Oregon when woolgrowers were more able to organize for self protection, and there certainly never was a time when they had more interests at stake.
At the next session of the legislature a strong effort is to be made to repeal the present coyote bounty law and a direct death blow is to be aimed at the sheep business in the two-mile limit herd law which is being formulated by a few Eastern Oregon legislators. This law which is in operation in Idaho has practically ruined the sheep business in that state. The allotment of ranges under the new Forest Reserve will also come under the State Woolgrowers' Association.
The majority of the sheep men tributary to Heppner have joined the organization and you are earnestly urged to sign the blank below and send same together with \$3 (dues), in enclosed addressed envelope. Do not delay but send by return mail, thus helping along an organization that will be of benefit to all woolgrowers in the state. Next meeting on January 20, 1903. Full attendance requested.
