Dead Auditor Was Short.

Astoria, Dec. 26.—Examination of the accounts of the late Auditor and Police Judge, Henry E. Nelson, show that he was short about \$5000. His defalcations cover a period of five or six years, and were the result of a thorough system of warrant raising. The Auditor bought warrants for local buyers, paying cash when claims were presented. Afterwards he would draw the warrants, payable to bearer, in increased amounts. Experts are at work on the books, and it is believed the shortage will be found to reach fully \$6000. His bondsmen will be held for amounts stolen from 1896 to 1902. A few warrants thus fraudulently raised were presented to the city treasurer this year. The discovery has created a sensation the late Auditor having enjoyed the unbounded confidence of the people. The city's loss will be small.

E. E. Lyons has been arrested at Ashland for horse stealing. Already 50 head of stolen horses have been traced to his transactions.

It is claimed that the salt trust has been broken and that a receiver will be sought.
