THOMAS H. TONGUE DEAD

Paralysis is Brought on by
Acute Indigestion.

PASSES AWAY WITH NO PAIN

Daughter Bertha at His Side--Many
Expressions of Sorrow in
Washington.

Washington, Jan. 11.—Representative
Thomas H. Tongue, of the First Oregon
Congressional District, in the presence
of his daughter Bertha and his secre-
tary, Miss Ruane, died suddenly in his
room at the Irvington, in this city, at
12:50 this afternoon. A few minutes
before he passed away he lapsed into
unconsciousness, and died without a
word, without any suffering. His son,
Thomas H., Jr., did not reside with his
father, but was notified of his approach-
ing end, and hastened to his father's
bedside but did not reach there until
after he had passed away.

The physicians who were summoned,
and the family physician, Dr. Boree, as
well as the Coroner, agree that death
was due to acute indigestion, which
superinduced paralysis of the heart.
Mr. Tongue had been in unusual health,
and except for occasional attacks of
dyspepsia, to which has been subject of
late years, has not complained of feeling
badly this Winter. He considered that
he was in better health than he had been
in for two years past, in fact, Mr.
Tongue attended a dinner last night,
and did not retire until a late hour.
When he slept late this morning con-
trary to custom, nothing was thought of
it.

At 10 o'clock he received a call from
two Oregon friends, H. H. Gilroy and
Orville Dodge, with whom he discussed
at length matters of personal and politi-
cal character. During the stay of these
gentlemen he remained in bed, but rose
and dressed as they left, and had a light
breakfast in his room. He said at the
time that his appetite was not good, and
complained slightly of dyspepsia. At
his request his daughter, Bertha, brought
him a soda solution, which he drank,
and remarked that he thought that
would fix him all right. She, however,
was somewhat concerned, as he looked
unusually pale, and asked if he did not
want a doctor. He replied that he did
not; that he would soon be at his normal
condition. He went through his morn-
ing mail, and then lay down on the
couch to read the papers. His daugh-
ter joked with him slightly about being
sick and too stubborn to have a doctor,
but he insisted that he was not ill. A
few minutes later Miss Bertha noticed
that her father was breathing heavily
and deeply. She became alarmed and
telephoned at once for a number of
physicians, fearing the worst. She also
sent word to her brother.

Before either the doctors or his son ar-
rived, however, Representative Tongue
had passed away, having become uncon-
scious at the time heavy breathing set
in. In his last moments of conscious-
ness he suffered nothing beyond the
natural disturbances caused by an at-
tack of dyspepsia. He had no con-
sciousness of his true condition as he
lapsed into insensibility. His end was
quiet and peaceful.

Fight the Plague.

That the bubonic plague is raging in
San Francisco is the firm belief of Dr.
Fagan, health officer of Victoria, B. C.
An immediate quarantine of the entire

Pacific Coast against San Francisco is
the method he advocates to prevent the
invasion of this dreaded disease into
other communities. He has recently
returned from a trip to San Francisco,
during which he made a personal in-
vestigation of the circumstances there,
and has already taken steps to quaran-
tine British Columbia. On his return
he stopped in Portland and Seattle and
held conferences with the health officers
of these cities in which he invited them
to act in unison with him in fighting
against the dangers of the disease.

Health Officer Biersdorf, of Portland,
has taken up the fight, and will do what
he can to quarantine Oregon. Oregon
has no State Board of Health, and can-
not adopt as effective quarantine meas-
ures as Washington or British Columbia,
but Dr. Biersdorf will ask the Govern-
ment to petition the Surgeon-General of the
United States to give Oregon the pro-
tection of the United States public health
and marine hospital service, which has
power to declare the quarantine in the
absence of a State Board of Health.
The local health officers of Seattle do
not regard the matter so seriously, and
as yet no action has been taken in
Washington. The State Board of
Health, however, has not considered
the question, and some action may be
taken by that body.

LEGISLATURE ORGANIZED.

**Brownell President of the Senate,
Harris Speaker.**

Salem, Ore. Jan. 12.—The Oregon
Legislature organized this afternoon
with George C. Brownell, of Clackamas
County, as President of the Senate, and
L. T. Harris, of Lane County, as Speaker
of the House. The caucus of the Senate
Republicans took 18 ballots before a
change of one vote gave the victory to
Brownell.

In the House caucus 19 ballots were
required to make a choice. Just before
the last ballot, Eddy, who had lost sev-
eral votes to Harris, withdrew in the
latter's favor, and Harris was elected.
Upon motion of Davey, the third candi-
date, the nomination was made unani-
mous. It is understood that in making
committee appointments Mr. Harris
will deal very liberally with the sup-
porters of both Eddy and Davey.

At the close of the organization both
Houses adjourned out of respect to the
memory of the late Congressman Tongue.

To Aid Irrigation.

Baker City, Or., Jan. 10.—Baker Coun-
ty is in line with other sections through-
out the state in the matter of irrigation.
The Baker County Irrigation Associa-
tion is the title of an organization formed
in this city which held its first monthly
meeting this week. N. C. Haskell is
president, C. H. Stuller, secretary, and
W. S. Levens, treasurer. Vice-presi-
dents have been appointed in each vot-
ing precinct, and already the member-
ship is close to 100. No actual canvas
of the county has been made for mem-
bers.

In addition to generally aiding irri-
gation, the association has for one of its
objects the collection of data, statistics
and maps of the county, plainly show-
ing the number of acres of land open to
settlement, location of water supplies
and sites adaptable for the installation
of storage reservoirs. As a visit is ex-
pected in the early Spring from officials
of the Government who would come
here with a view to becoming acquaint-
ed with the topography of the country,
it is the idea of the association to have
this matter compiled immediately in
order that it may be forwarded to Wash-
ington and reach the hands of the
officials that they might study its many
needs and thus be prepared to under-
stand the lay of the land more compre-
hensively.

The objects of the organization, as
outlined in the platform, are: "The
reclamation of all arid lands of Baker
County, Or., and the construction by
the Federal Government, or by private
enterprise, of storage reservoirs or
irrigation canals, and for the conserva-
tion of the water supply of Baker
County, and to save for use in aid of
irrigation the flood-waters which now
run to waste, and to reclaim for actual
settlement the arid lands of the coun-
ty."

"The adoption of a harmonious and
simple system of irrigation laws in this
state under which the right to use the
waters of all streams for irrigation shall
vest in the user, and become appurte-
nant to the land irrigated, and that the
beneficial use be the measure of such
right."

To lend what aid and assistance is
within the power of the association to
carry out the objects and purposes
above mentioned, and to aid and assist
in the settlement of such lands as may
hereafter be reclaimed."
