Death of a Pioneer.

N. O. Smead was born at West Potsdam, New York, July 28, 1828. He came west crossing the plains with his family in 1864, and resided in Montana, Idaho and Nevada until 1880, when he came to Oregon, and located on a ranch near Ella.

Deceased leaves two sons, W. W. Smead, of Heppner, and a son in Cleveland, Ohio. The funeral was conducted by the Masons at Ione, Thursday. Mr. Smead was a highly respected citizen.

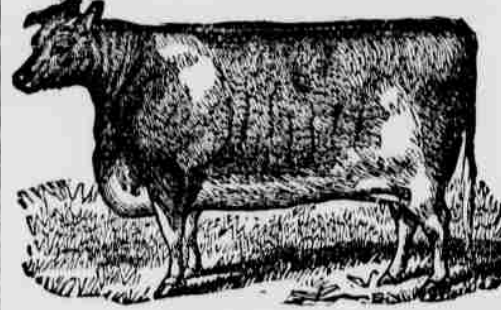
