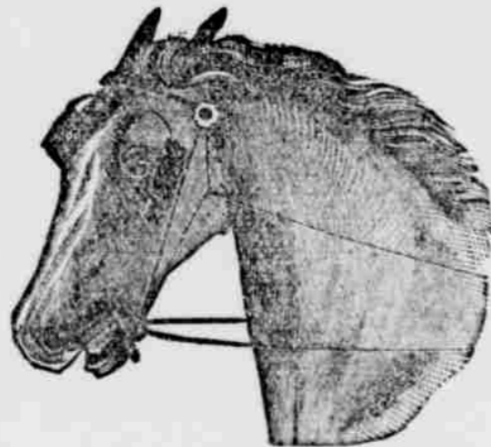

FOR LACK OF INTEREST

Hitchcock May Pass Oregon in Irrigation Plans.

NO REPORT HAS BEEN MADE

The Chance for Oregon Securing One of the First Works is Fast Ebbing Away.

Washington, Jan. 26.—As soon as Congress adjourns and Senators and Representatives are well away from Washington, Secretary Hitchcock will take steps looking to apportioning among the Western States the irrigation work first to be undertaken under the general law passed last session. Until that time no public announcement as to the choice will be made, as the Secretary has determined that political interference will not be tolerated with regard to this great work, but that only such projects as are, on their face, most attractive and promising, shall be considered and followed out.

The chance of Oregon securing one of the first works is fast ebbing away. Since the irrigation convention held about seven weeks ago, the Geological Survey has heard nothing as to local projects from the special committee, and is somewhat at a loss to understand the apparent lack of interest in the work on the part of the Oregon people. Already the survey has submitted to Secretary Hitchcock the records with regard to a number of projects that are recommended more or less strongly, but none in Oregon.

The survey officials here have been waiting for the irrigation committee, which was chosen to advise the department as to the most favored localities in Oregon, in order that the wishes of the people might be carried out as nearly as possible. If this report is not soon made, the survey will not have time, before the Secretary announces his choice, to inspect and report upon the sites of proposed works in Oregon, and the state will have to take a second choice, and possibly wait for a year or more, until sufficient funds have accumulated in the Treasury to cover the cost of the favored Oregon scheme.

In the meantime, nothing has been done with regard to the Deschutes withdrawal under the Carey act, upon which a report was submitted some weeks ago. Unfortunately, the Geographical Survey knows more about this locality than any other, but, with private enterprise holding right of way, and there being no disposition to uproot vested rights in this vicinity, some other site must be chosen. If Oregon is not on the first list of works to be constructed, the most it can expect next Summer will be detailed examination of several projects which are reported upon by the local committee, if such report is ever made.

FAIR BILL PASSES.

Vote in the Senate Was Almost Unanimous.

Salem, Jan. 22.—The Lewis and Clark Fair bill passed the Senate this afternoon with only two dissenting votes. It has now passed both houses, and after being enrolled and signed by the Speaker of the House and President of the Senate will be sent to the Governor for his approval. Two attempts to amend the bill were promptly voted down, and the bill was passed as it came to the Senate from the House.

While the bill was under consideration this afternoon enthusiastic addresses were made in its favor by Senators Hunt, Fulton, Pierce, Kuykendall and Booth. The latter two have not been advocates of the holding of the fair, but since it has become apparent that a fair is to be held they wished to give it the aid of their votes and the pledge of their heartiest support that the Exposition may be made a success. Senator Fulton's address in behalf of the bill was an oratorical effort seldom surpassed, and from the time the applause following the speech had died away it was apparent that the bill would pass the Senate with but slight opposi-

tion. Senator Marsters, who offered amendments to the bill, would not vote against it, but asked to be excused from voting. Senator Miller, of Linn, and President Brownell were the only Senators who voted "No."

Nickelsen Suspended.

Spokane, Wash., Jan 22.—(Special)—Rev. C. D. Nickelsen, the young Methodist Episcopal minister from Colfax, Wash., was yesterday found guilty of coveting another man's wife, and of proposing and planning suicide.

The committee which has been hearing evidence for the past three days reached this decision by a unanimous vote. This means that Mr. Nickelsen will be suspended from exercising the ministerial functions until the next meeting of the Columbia River Conference to be held in Spokane next October.

The following order of suspension was drawn up and signed by each member of the committee:

"After consideration, the committee declares its will in the following action: The committee called to investigate certain rumors affecting the moral character of Rev. C. D. Nickelsen, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Colfax, Wash., after listening to the testimony and making a full investigation in accordance with certain charges and specifications, setting forth said rumors, hereby declares that in its judgment the evidence is of such a nature as justifies his suspension from the discharge of the ministerial functions until the next annual session of the Columbia River Conference."

Nickelsen is the handsome young preacher who became enamored of a Mrs. Dunbar, of North Yakima, while she was a member of his parish at Goldendale. He wrote to her about two months ago, asking her to join him in Spokane and intimating that they would commit suicide together. She sent a lawyer instead and investigation followed. Nickelsen pleaded temporary infatuation as his defense.
