PORTAGE ROAD AT DALLES

State Will appropriate \$165,000
for the Project.

VERY LITTLE OPPOSITION

Conceded to Be One of the Most Im-
portant Bills Before the
Legislature.

Salem, Or., Feb. 11.—Only four votes
were recorded against the portage rail-
road bill when it passed the Senate this
morning. No Senator had ought to say
against it, but representatives of every
section of the state gave it their support.
It passed the Senate under suspension
of the rules, moved by Senator Fulton,
of Clatsop County. The bill passed the
Senate upon its merits as a measure of
vast import to the industrial and com-
mercial interests of all the Columbia
River region.

As soon as the Senate convened this
morning Senator Fulton asked unani-
mous consent to call up H. B. 215,
which is known as the portage railroad
bill. There was no objection and the
bill was read the second and third
times.

"In my opinion, Mr. President," said
Senator Fulton, "this is the most im-
portant measure that has been before
this Legislature. It does not carry so
large an appropriation as one other bill
that we have passed, but I undertake to
say that, as measured by the beneficial
results that will be realized by the
commercial interests of the state, this
will prove a more meritorious appropria-
tion than any other we have made or
could make. Its purpose is the opening
of the vast grain fields of Eastern
Oregon to the markets of the world.
The construction of a portage road as
contemplated by this bill will effect a
reduction in freight rates, which are
now almost prohibitive. For this reason
it is of the greatest importance in
aiding the development of that rapidly
growing section of the state. If I
thought this bill would meet any op-
position, I would speak further upon
the beneficial results that will follow
the passage of this bill; but I believe
that the Senators so fully appreciate its
importance that it will be passed by an
almost unanimous vote."

"I would feel that I had failed in my
duty to my constituents if I did not give
my voice and my vote to the support of
this measure," said Senator Pierce.
"The construction of this road will be
of benefit not only of Eastern Oregon,
but to all the Columbia River country."

Senator Kuykendall said that he ex-
pected to support the bill, although he
realized that the size of the appropria-
tions of this Legislature will be very
great. "I know that this Legislature
will receive many kicks on account of
its appropriations, but I believe that it
is due to the people and business in-
terests of Eastern Oregon that this bill
shall pass, and that the portage road
shall be built. We are supporting this
bill upon the understanding that the
people of Eastern Oregon will consent
to a repeal of the scalp bounty law.
The construction of the portage road
will cost no more than the scalp bounty
law, and the results will be vastly
greater."

No one spoke against the bill, and
only four votes against it—Senators
Daly, Miller, Smith of Yamhill and
President Brownell.

Coal to be Scarce.

Victoria, B. C., Feb. 13.—The strike
which has been declared in the coal
mines of the Crow's Nest Coal Company,

at Fernie, Michel, Morrissey and Coal
Creek, will, it is feared, be almost as
grave in its indirect as in its direct ef-
fects, which threatens to close every
smelter in the Kootenay and Boundary
countries. Recently the miners of
Nanaimo affiliated with the Western
Federation of Miners, in direct antago-
nism to Ralph Smith, M. P., who warned
them that in so doing they would be
imperilling the good relations which had
existed between them and the new
Vancouver Coal Company. It is now
considered likely that if the strike is not
settled in Fernie, not only will there be
great suffering there, but the miners of
Nanaimo may be called out. This would
paralyze the coal trade of San Francisco.
The situation was viewed with the
greatest apprehension and coal retailers
are hurrying scows to Nanaimo to insure
a good reserve supply in case of trouble.

A special dispatch from Fernie says
the strike situation is not changed and
there is likely to be a long struggle.
The miners are determined that the
union shall be recognized and the
manager of the coal company is absolute-
ly opposed to meeting them. A deputa-
tion consisting of three miners from
Morrissey, Michel and Coal Creek tried
to present their grievances before
Manager Tonkin, but he refused to
listen. He will meet them individually
but not collectively. Manager Tonkin
says the miners are making better
wages than in any other place in
Canada. The coal company is not sell-
ing a pound of coal to citizens or miners,
and people were not supplied here. The
weather this morning was 18 degrees
below zero. Electric lights will likely
be shut off in two days, as there is little
coal on hand at the power plant.

Death of a Morrow County Pioneer.

Mrs. Charlotte Wise Parkins depart-
ed this life January 23, 1903, at the home
of her eldest daughter, Mrs. B. E. Mc-
Aister at Pullman, Wash.

Mrs. Parkins was born August 24,
1824, having reached the age of 78 years
five months lacking one day. She was
born at Ithaca, New York. At the age
of 13 years she with her father's family
moved to Yanesville, Ohio, where her
mother died soon after their arrival
there. Then her father with his five
children removed to Knoxville, Illinois,
where her father died, leaving the
children alone to work their way in the
world. She was married to James
Parks on March 10, 1842.

In 1865 her husband was taken by the
hand of death leaving her with 11 chil-
dren. In 1882, with four of her sons
she came to Morrow county and took
claim near Lexington, where she lived
until about nine years ago. Since then
she has stopped at different places with
her children.
