**Right of Way for Portage Road.**

Washington, Feb. 11.—Representative Moody is delighted at the passage of the bill for the state portage road between The Dalles and Celilo, and says as soon as he is advised of the right of way he hopes to secure the necessary permit from the Chief Engineer of the War Department.

Representative Moody anticipates that the Board of Engineers that examined the obstructions in the Columbia there last Summer will submit plans to overcome this obstruction by canal and locks within the limitations authorized in the last river and harbor bill. He says that from the best information he can get, the Board's report cannot be completed until after Congress adjourns, but he hopes it will be filled early in the Spring, and that if its estimates are within the limitations of the river and harbor bill, work can begin at once, since it was authorized by that act, providing the engineers' report shows that the obstruction can be overcome for not to exceed \$4,000,000.

A favorable report on the Government project, he says, will not in any way qualify the utility of the state portage scheme, since at best it will take several years to complete the Government work, and that in the meantime the benefits in freight reductions will, in his judgment, justify the state expenditure for the portage road.
