## NOT TILL JUNE.

## Congressional Election for First District.

"A special election for the purpose of choosing a Congressman from the First District to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Thomas H. Tongue will be called between May 1 and June 15," said Governor Chamberlain last night. In giving his reason for calling the election at the time mentioned, the Governor said: "A greater number of citizens will be able to vote at that time. It is a season when the farmers can leave their work, and the roads are good enough to allow them to get to the polling places without inconvenience."

"The new Congressman would not see much of a special session of Congress if one should be called immediately following the present one," suggested the reporter.

"That is true," answered Mr. Chamberlain; "but it cannot be helped. Between May 1 and June 15 is the natural time for an election in Oregon, and it is the time I shall call this election for. The present Congressional term expires in March, and it would be useless to elect a man to serve during the short time before this term expires. If a man is to be elected for the coming term he cannot take office before March 4, so it would be impossible for him to attend the present session. A special session, if it should be called, would adjourn before the Summer months set in. I do not believe it is possible for a Congressman to be elected in time to take his place before the next regular session."

"If I should call an election now some sections of the country would not be represented at all in the vote. I want this to be an election in which every citizen of the state can take part. At this time the roads are bad in the country, and there are many good citizens from the country who could not take the trouble to go to polling places. Again, they are busy with their farming and other work, and could not well leave it. Between May 1 and June 15 is the natural time for the election in this state, and I do not think the rule should be changed in this case."

## Naval Bill is Passed.

The House has passed the Naval appropriation bill, with many amendments.

Provision is made for an increase in the number of midshipmen and of officers.

Provision is made for three new battleships, one armored cruiser, two steel training ships and one wooden brig for training, construction to be by contract, unless a combination of bidders is found to exist, in which case the Secretary of the Navy may have the ships built at Government yards. Domestic materials and machinery are to be used.

The Secretary is authorized to expend \$500,000 in submarine torpedo boats which stand the test of competition.

Midshipmen guilty of hazing may be expelled from the Naval Academy.

## Plenty of Wheat Left.

By wheat men well informed on the subject it is reliably estimated that there are now in railroad warehouses in Walla Walla, Umatilla and Columbia counties approximately 1,750,000 bushels of club wheat. Of course, a considerable amount of wheat has been sold and awaits shipment, but only about 300,000 bushels is known to have been disposed of.

Last year at this time there was nearly twice as much wheat in railroad warehouses along the Washington & Columbia River and Oregon Railroad & Navigation lines as at the present time. It is estimated that the W. & C. R. warehouses hold 1,000,000 bushels, and that the O. R. & N. has 750,000 in store.

In Columbia county, where 30 per cent of the cereal crop is barley, the movement of grain is complete, some small lots remaining in warehouses on the Turner extension of the W. & C. R.—Tribune.

## Robbed Three Trains.

Missoula, Mont., Feb. 19.—Postoffice Inspector Beatty, after interviewing Napoleon Savoy, who is suspected of being the bandit who held up the North Coast Limited, on the Northern Pacific, single-handed, at Bearmouth, Mont., says the prisoner answers the description of the robber minutely. Beatty says that Savoy also answers the description sent out of the robber who held up the Northern Pacific train at Sand Point, Idaho, a short time before the Bearmouth robbery, and the man who held up a train on the same road in Oregon last year.

A peculiarity in the descriptions has been the large and stubby hands of the bandit, and these Savoy has. Beatty is of the opinion that one man did the three jobs.

James Dignan, a Spokane contractor, fell from a third story window while in a trance, and was instantly killed.

William McKay, a well-known trapper of Southern Oregon, perished in the mountains of Trinity county, California, Friday.

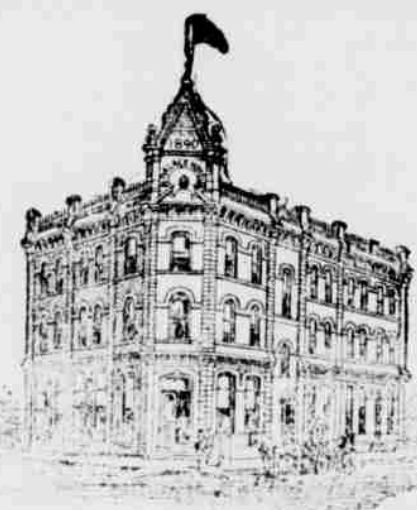
