WAS A SUCCESS

FIRST ANNUAL TOURNAMENT OF HEPPNER GUN CLUB.

Good Shooting by Heppner Sportsmen--Frank Howe Shot High Average.

The first annual tournament of the Heppner Rod and Gun Club occurred in this city Sunday and Monday and was a great success.

While the skies were not cloudless, the weather was favorable, and the only complaint came from the spectators, because it was a little too cool for comfort.

Several squads of Pendleton's crack shots came over Saturday evening, while several of the good ones from Portland participated in the events.

The shooting grounds were nicely arranged for convenience, and thousands of inanimate targets were pulverized before the unerring aim of the many shooters in attendance.

It was thoroughly demonstrated that Heppner has some good shots. Only seven of the shooters got an average above 80 per cent and among this number four were Heppner people.

Frank Howe, the genial representative of the Remington Arms Co., and the U. M. C. Co., shot the highest average, scoring 89.3 per cent. Mr. Howe entered only as a practice shooter not taking any of the money. His clean scores and uniformity of shooting each day was a feature for the spectators, and the blue rocks that escaped his aim were scarce and far between.

Considering the fact that there were several events in which there were doubles, the averages all the way through were high.

Next to Mr. Howe came Fred Wait, of Pendleton, who shot an average of 86.6 consequently carrying off a good share of the money.

Lee Matlock of Heppner was a close third with an average of 84.5.

Ben Patterson who missed one event, held up the high average of 84.6. He kept them all guessing, and Sunday afternoon when he went out after 25 straight he got them with hands down. H. J. Stillman, of Pendleton shot an average of 82.5, and Guy Minor and J. H. Blake, of Heppner averaged 81 and 80.8 respectively.

All of the Heppner shooters got money. The manner in which everything was conducted was very highly spoken of by the visitors.

In speaking of the shoot, Mr. Howe said: "It was certainly a credit to Heppner sportsmen. The arrangements could not have been better, and everything was absolutely on the square."
