

TO WIPE OUT FOREIGNERS.

Plans of Plotters Who are in League With Tung.

New York, March 4.—Rumors are again prevalent of approaching trouble in China, says a dispatch from London to the Tribune. An anti-foreign movement within the next few months is declared to be inevitable. The Standard correspondent at Tien Tsin says the entertainments which are being prepared at the palace for members of the legations are like the treacherous friendliness that preceded the Indian mutiny.

Tung and Tuan are declared to be the villains of the plot, and the Standard correspondent thinks that the idea once again will be the powerlessness of the court to check rebellion. The northern hordes will come down under the two exiled leaders and nominally overpower Pekin and at the same time swell their following with all the force in the capital and begin a grand march of extermination against everything foreign. This time, however, the Yangtse region and every port must rise simultaneously, and for this purpose all the Yangtse defenses are being brought to highest state of effectiveness.

Russia is very much alive to the situation. The latest information received at St. Petersburg from the secret emissaries of the Russian Legation at Pekin indicates that nearly the whole Celestial Empire is ramified by a huge network of secret Boxer committees which only await an opportunity and a given signal to sweep the detested white barons out of the country.

Williamson in Washington

Washington, March 5.—Representative Williamson, of Oregon arrived in Washington late last night and registered at the Dewey. This morning he sought out Representative Cannon, the prospective Speaker, and talked over committee appointments. He told Cannon he desired an appointment on the river and harbor committee, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Representative Tongue. Cannon replied that he would not consider committee assignments until next November, but in the meantime would like from each new member a brief statement of his past legislative career on which to base his selections.

The balance of the day Williamson spent in looking about for accommodations for himself and family for the coming session. He was somewhat surprised to learn that he could provide for them at the hotel for \$400 a month, but he said he was much puzzled to know what to do with the other \$16 of his salary each month. He thinks he will take a house during the sessions and will make further investigations to that end. Williamson will remain here about two weeks conferring with the two Senators and looking after matters in the departments.

Colonel W. F. Butler of Baker City, who was the Democratic candidate against Williamson in the last campaign, came here with the new member. He is on a business trip to New York.

Representative Williamson brought with him his credentials, which he will file with the clerk of the House.

Names of New Warships.

Washington, March 5.—Secretary Moody today rendered a decision as to the states after which the five battleships provided in the new naval law shall be named. The three 16,000-ton battleships are to be named Kansas, Vermont and Minnesota and the two 12,000-ton vessels Mississippi and Idaho. The Secretary in his annual report expects to bring up the subject of the names to be given new battleships. He is anxious that the names of such historic vessels as the Cumberland, Merrimac and Constitution shall be perpetuated in the new Navy, and he will recommend that Congress provide for this in the next naval law. Under the present law it is stipulated that all battleships shall be named after the states of the Union.

That no time is to be lost in the construction of the new ships is evident in the action of the Secretary today directing the general board to prepare circulars for the 16,000-ton ships, which are to be of the Connecticut and Tennessee class. As there are no 12,000-ton ships on the naval lists, it will take longer to prepare the plans and specifications for the Mississippi and Idaho.

Election June 1.

Governor Chamberlain has ordered a special election for Monday, June 1, to select a Congressman to fill the vacancy made by the death of Thomas H. Tongue.

The Sheriffs of the several counties will now notify the judges of election to hold a special election. Printed notices for the same must be issued.

Nominations for Congressmen must be filed with the Secretary of State not less than 45 days prior to the election.

Murder in First Degree.

Eugene, Ore., March 4.—Elliott Lyons, who, while resisting arrest for horse-stealing at his home near Eugene on February 5, shot and killed Sheriff Withers, of this county, was tonight found guilty of murder in the first degree by the jury in ten minutes. He will be sentenced Friday.

The 9-year-old daughter of John Larson, a farmer near Sherwood, Ore., was horribly burned Wednesday while helping her father burn brush on a clearing. She cannot recover.

The strike against the reduction plants at Colorado Springs has been carried into the Cripple Creek district.

The Moors at Tangiers are indulging in anti-foreign riots and several Spanish subjects have been injured.

The Baker county grand jury has ordered the clerk's office repaired so as to prevent outsiders from having access to the vaults and records of the county.
