A BUSY CONCERN

WORK AT HEPPNER MILL AND
MANUFACTURING CO.

Running Every Day in Making
Furniture and Doing Wood
Work.

The Heppner Mill and Manufacturing
Company is now a busy concern. The
company first commenced operations on
the first of the year by leasing one half
interest in Slocum's planing mill. The
business has increased until the com-
pany has now purchased the entire
stock of the mill and leased the property

"We now have all we can do in manu-
facturing a line of furniture from native
woods, and wood work in general" said
manager J. C. Scott to a GAZETTE re-
porter.

"This Blue Mountain pine is fine wood
for certain kinds of furniture," said Mr.
Scott.

Examination of the furniture turned
out is good proof of this assertion.

"We are now making sash and doors,
which is something new to Heppner,"
said Mr. Scott. "Heretofore, all the
sash and doors were shipped in."

"We will not only supply Heppner,
but have commenced to ship our product
already. We have just filled a good
order for Ione, and we expect to be pre-
pared to furnish the interior country."

The company is employing seven men
with a payroll of about \$150 a week.
Mr. Scott stated that there would
soon be employment for ten men.

A good steam dry kiln has been added
and the plant is now very complete.

FIVE PLANS CHOSEN.

First Irrigation Work to be Done
by Government.

Washington, March 13. — Secretary
Hitchcock, of the Interior Department,
has granted authority for the acqui-
sition of necessary property, rights of way,
etc., prior to the construction of irriga-
tion works in five localities. These
projects are: Wyoming, Sweetwater
dam; Montana, Milk River; Colorado,
Gunnison tunnel; Nevada, Truckee;
Arizona, Salt River reservoir.

These projects are estimated to cost
\$7,000,000 and will provide for the irriga-
tion of about 600,000 acres of arid land.
In addition thereto the Gray Bull
reservoir project is to be taken up im-
mediately.

The construction remains subject to
the possibility of obtaining the necessary
rights and the adjustment of private
claims in such manner as to comply
with the act approved June 17, 1902.

Does Not Prejudice Oregon.

Washington, March 13. — The an-
nouncement today that Secretary Hitch-
cock has decided to begin the construc-
tion of National irrigation works in
Wyoming, Montana, Nevada, Arizona
and Colorado does not prejudice the
project which is to be carried out on
Butter Creek, Oregon. The five projects
referred to are those that have been
under investigation by the Geological
Survey from three to 12 years, and are
the ones on which the most detailed
examinations have been made. But in
no case have the examinations been
completed nor are plans ready for
advertisement. Today's announcement
means that the department will im-
mediately turn its attention toward ac-
quiring full title to the reservoir sites
and rights of way of canals by purchase
or condemnation, whenever private
ownership conflicts with the proposed

work, and if in any instance the title
cannot be obtained the project will be
abandoned. The Geological Survey, as
a result of former study of these several
localities, now has rough plans for
reservoirs and canals, and final plans
will be hastened and contracts let.

As heretofore stated, the Geological
Survey has two experts now making
surveys and examinations on Butter
Creek, and a third will soon join them.
These examinations will be final, and,
when their report is made and a project
is roughly outlined, provided no unfor-
seen obstacles arise to show the project
impracticable, this work will be added
to the approved list and steps be taken
looking to construction.

Hydrographer Newell roughly esti-
mates the five projects designated by
the Secretary, while the reclamation
fund at this time aggregates about \$10,-
000,000, thus leaving \$3,000,000 available
for other projects that may be approved
later. Furthermore, the fund is con-
stantly growing, so there will be no
lack of funds with which to commence
work on Butter Creek, when the plans
are finally formulated. Part of the funds
to be used in other states are those de-
rived from sales of Oregon lands, but a
major portion of the Oregon fund for
the past 2½ years remains to its credit,
and is more than enough to build the
favored irrigation system in that state.

The report of the Oregon irrigation
committee recently forwarded to the
Secretary of Agriculture finally found its
way to Mr. Newell, and has been by
him referred to the field officers in Ore-
gon. He was somewhat surprised that
the committee made no recommenda-
tion, and has therefore asked the field
officers to examine all the projects
named, as they can conveniently reach
them. The field force will be augmented
by new men from time to time, and
examinations and surveys will be con-
tinued throughout the summer, although
the first work will be the completion of
investigation on Butter Creek.

BLACKMAN HOME

VISITED STATES OF IDAHO, MONTANA
AND UTAH.

Special Commissioner in Interest
of the Lewis and Clark
Fair.

Hon. Henry Blackman, special com-
missioner for the Lewis and Clark Fair
to Idaho, Utah and Montana, returned to
his home in this city Monday evening.

Mr. Blackman left home on the tenth
of January and after visiting in Cali-
fornia, came back and went direct to
Boise, Idaho, where he remained for
seven days. From Boise, he went to
Helena, Montana, where he stayed for
a week, and from there went to Salt
Lake City, Utah.

As a representative of the Fair Mr.
Blackman visited the legislatures of the
three states in the interest of the ap-
propriations and for the Fair in general.

Mr. Blackman comes home well
pleased with the outlook, and says that
public sentiment is in favor of greater
appropriations than were allowed by the
legislatures. He believes that the
amounts now raised will be greatly in-
creased before 1905 to help make the
Fair one of the greatest events that ever
occurred in the West.

Mr. Blackman found the people
generally more in favor of Portland than
St. Louis, for the reason that it is more
of a Western proposition.

To the Evening Telegram Mr. Black-
man gave out the following:

A Harmony Building for the four
states in the Lewis and Clark discovery
is the suggestion reported by Henry
Blackman, special commissioner for the
Fair to Idaho, Utah and Montana. "This
was a notion put forward several times
by very prominent men," said Mr.
Blackman this morning. The four
states, Washington, Oregon, Idaho and
Montana, would thus have a common
memorial of their vital interest in the
Fair."

Mr. Blackman has some old stories to
tell of the legislative methods in
Montana. "First," he explained,
"Montana made an appropriation of
\$35,000 for the St. Louis fair, including
\$10,000 for a building. Two thousand
dollars was appropriated for the Lewis
and Clark Fair and all the exhibits were
to be transferred from St. Louis to Port-
land. The bill was amended in the
Senate after it had already passed the
house, to read \$40,000 for St. Louis and
\$7000 for Portland. That was the death
of the bill as it turned out. The House
failed to concur. There was a conference
and then in the scramble for legislation
the Legislature adjourned without con-
firming the conference report. St. Louis
gets nothing; Portland gets nothing, yet
the bill had passed."
