RENTING STUFFED ANIMALS.

Merchants in the City Use Them to Make a Display in the Holiday Season.

The trade in stuffed animals gets brisker with the approach of the holiday season. "I don't mean by that," said a William street taxidermist, according to the New York Times, "that we are selling more of them. We are not. We never do sell stuffed beasts in herds at this time of the year, but our renting list swells prodigiously. People whose business requires them to use stuffed animals and birds as an advertisement generally want an extra duck or dog or bear added to their stock for a month or two preceding and following Christmas. A trademark of this kind of good quality costs anywhere from \$5 to \$75 and as those that are used merely as 'supers' are needed only a few months in the year, it is cheaper to rent them than buy them outright. Almost every merchant in town, of high or low degree, makes an extra splash at this season by exhibiting a polar bear or some other festive animal, consequently our rentals amount to a rather nice income. Some seasons we do a pretty thriving business with theatrical companies, also, but this year the drama seems to have become too realistic to rely on stuffed art for its effects, and our orders for property fowls and quadrupeds have been few."

CHAMPION SNAKE HUNTER.

A Frenchman Who Was Credited with Killing 30,000 Venomous Reptiles.

It is not well known that certain parts of France are infested with poisonous serpents, against which warfare is waged by state-paid serpent hunters. They are killed in thousands, and the price per head is 20c. There was some time ago a famous serpent killer in the forests of Southampton, John Milly, who in 42 years of hunting killed more than 29,000 vipers, says the London Tatler. A Frenchman named Courtol, who hunted in the Loire district, can be compared to Milly, as he was credited with having killed 30,000 venomous reptiles. His only weapons were one or two massive sticks. As soon as he saw the serpent he advanced and hit it violently, either killing or stunning it; with the second stick he pinned it to earth and cut off the head with a huge pair of scissors. But along with these simple weapons Courtol possessed a thorough knowledge of the habit of serpents. He knew when and where to find them. In two days near Puy-a-Clermont he killed 230 of them, and not only did he kill the poisonous creatures, but he would capture them living when desired.

MUSIC OF THE CUBANS.

It Is Even Worse Than the Horrible Noises Made by the Algerians.

Cubans show a semi-savage preference for such music as is made by a band composed of a stamp-mill sort of a crank piano, a pair of sugar kettle tom-toms and a man with a horse-radish grater called a "giro" and a flat file with which to scrape it—the combined outfit producing a discordant potpourri that might easily dislocate the teeth of any self-respecting handsaw, says the Detroit Free Press. This example of music as the Cubans fancy it is even worse than the finger-drumming and wire-snapping musical murders committed in Tunisian bazars and Algerian cafes chantantes. The lauded but lugubrious Cuban national hymn is best esteemed when performed by one of these bands of inharmonic banditti, and the national dance, that monotonous combination of motions that suggests that the dancer is trying to shoo a flea off the small of his back and also go easy on a stone-bruised heel, can only be adequately performed to the music of these African agitators of cat-gut, raw-hide and perforated tin. The truth is the Cubans will have to learn music all over again.

An Up-to-Date Shave.

The antiseptic shaving saloon is the latest achievement in hygienic science, says Tit-Bits. The victim is seated in an enameled iron chair, with his neck and shoulders enveloped in a rubber pad that has been dipped in an antiseptic solution. Previously the razor, soap dish, and brush have been sterilized by half an hour's hard boiling. Nothing is allowed to touch the face that has not been either sterilized or disinfected antiseptically. Even the finger tips of the operator are dipped in a solution. Taps are turned by the foot, and the drawers where towels are kept are microbe-proof.

A Sexton's Record.

Sexton Mark McTigue has had charge of the village cemetery in Kokomo, Ind., for 46 years, and in that time has dug with his own hands some 5,000 graves.
