HEPPNER PUBLIC SCHOOL

The Closing Exercises Were a
Great Success.

PRESENTING OF DIPLOMAS

The Program Was Interesting and
Well Conducted--Banquet
and Ball.

Friday evening was looked upon by
the school children and teachers as one
of the happy events of their lives--an-
other school year's work completed.
The opera house, where the exercises
were held, was beautifully decorated
with flags, the background of the stage
being fir trees, and over the front of the
stage was the class motto in gold letters,
"Conquering and Still to Conquer." Long
before the exercises commenced the
opera house was packed to its
utmost capacity.

The first on the program was a selec-
tion by Heppner orchestra, which al-
ways pleases the audience. Rev. J. V.
Crawford delivered the prayer.

The graduates were Misses Fay Bar-
tholomew and Beulah Barker, and
Messrs Leo. S. Blackman and Glenn V.
Burroughs. They all used good judg-
ment in selecting their subjects and
delivered them with grace and ease,
which showed much ability and careful
training.

The vocal solo by Otheo Crawford was
well worthy of special mention.

The choruses by the school children
were well received.

One of the important features of the
evening was the address to the class by
Judge Ellis. Mr. Ellis spoke in high
terms of the great progress that had
been made in the Heppner schools in
the last fifteen years and said that now
it stood in the front ranks in comparison
with towns of the same population and
this was due to the efficient professor
and teachers who have labored hard to
bring it up to its high standard.

Mayor Frank Gilliam presented the
graduates with their diplomas. His re-
marks were brief, but complimented
Prof. Reid and the teachers in their
efforts the past year, and the pupils who
had labored diligently during the past
year.

The program concluded with an over-
ture by the orchestra.

Professor Reid deserves much praise
for the manner in which he has con-
ducted the Heppner schools and the
school board has shown their apprecia-
tion of his labors by re-electing him for
another year, which is the highest
compliment they could pay him. The
teachers also deserve mention, for what
could a professor accomplish if he did
not have the support of efficient teach-
ers, who carry out his instructions and
assist him in the work he has mapped
out. They also have been re-elected,
which proves that their work has been
entirely satisfactory.

We also feel equally proud of our
school board, who have showed good
judgment in selecting the right people
in the right places and are always work-
ing for the advancement of our schools.
Heppner is surely blessed with one of
the most essential features in any com-
munity—a good school.

BANQUET GIVEN BY TENTH GRADE.

in Roberts' hall in honor of the graduat-
ing class and those taking part in the
entertainment. There were a few in-
vited guests. A dainty luncheon was

BACK FROM HEPPNER.

District Attorney T. G. Halley Re-
turns After Attending Court.

Mayor Thomas G. Hailey returned
this morning from a trip to Heppner,
Morrow county, where he went to attend
the session of the circuit court as district
attorney.

Mr. Hailey left Pendleton Sunday and
went by way of Butter creek. He re-
ports the alfalfa crop in that district as
most excellent. The farmers of Morrow
county are complaining that the cold
weather is injuring their wheat, though
it is most too early for the damage to be
seen as yet.

Morrow county is the center of a large
influx of immigration at the present
time. Many people are taking up
timber claims and homestead rights in
that part of the state. Many of the old
homesteads, abandoned by their original
holders, are being taken.

The session of the court just closed
was held in the new court house, built
by Frank Duprat, of Pendleton. Mr.
Hailey thinks the Heppner building the
most convenient in the state. It is a
\$40,000 structure, built of native blue
stone, and is the most modern structure
of its kind in the state.

The finances of Morrow county are
in excellent condition. With the \$40,-
000 court house on their hands they will
be entirely out of debt in less than two
years.—East Oregonian.

SEALED BIDS FOR WOOL.

First Wool Sale this Season Held at
Arlington.

The first wool sale of the season under
the system of sealed bids, inaugurated
in this state for the first time last year,
came off in Arlington Monday. It was
a sorry disappointment to both seller
and buyer says the Oregonian. Over
500,000 pounds of wool was offered for
sale, but only about 50,000 pounds was
sold. Prices paid for those sold ranged
from 11½ cents to 13 cents. The offers
on the largest and best clips were all
declined because the ruling prices had
fallen below the owners' expectations.

The President's Views.

out the following statement:

"In speaking of the sudden political
developments in Ohio, the President
this afternoon said:

"I have not asked any man for his
support. I have had nothing whatever
to do with raising the issue as to my in-
dorsement. Sooner or later, it was
bound to arise; and inasmuch as it has
now arisen, of course those who favor
my administration and my nomination
will indorse them, and those who do
not will oppose."

"The President also said he was deep-
ly touched by the action of President
McKinley's home county, in which
Canton is situated, in instructing so
heartily in his favor. Nothing could
have pleased him more."
