From January 1, 1902, to March 31, 1903—a period of 15 months—the population of Oregon has increased more than 44,000. Unquestionably the immigration during the period has been greater than in any other 15 months in the history of the state, and the heavy tide is just setting in. Oregon in June, 1900, had a population of 413,256. Natural increase is about 2 1/2 per cent a year. Ad-

dining the immigration in the 19 months from June, 1900, to January, 1902, which was probably not less than 15,000, it may safely be set down that Oregon's population today exceeds 510,000.

POLICE SHOOT WILD BILL.

End of Bannock Indian Who Would Not Surrender.

Pocatella, Idaho, May 22.—"Wild Bill," who shot Dick Driscoll early Wednesday morning is now a good Indian. His redemption was effected last night by the Indian police of the Fort Hall reservation.

Bill was trying to sneak into Bannock Creek, where the police were laying for him. He was ordered to halt, but started to run instead. His horse was then shot, but he dismounted and was trying to escape on foot, when the police fired again, killing him.

Major Caldwell denies that "Wild Bill" was insane, and says that he was simply a bad Indian, who drank much whiskey. Dick Driscoll says he was bad with or without whiskey, and that when he came to his house Tuesday at midnight he was sober, but mean.

About 9 o'clock Wednesday morning "Wild Bill," who was a Bannock Indian, aroused Richard Driscoll, who lives on a ranch on the Snake River, near Salmon Falls, and asked for some blankets. Driscoll returned to his house and brought out a roll of bedding for him. Without further notice the Indian drew a revolver and shot Driscoll, following with another shot, which missed its mark. Driscoll's wound is close to the neck and just missed the collarbone and jugular.

Nothing This Year.

B. M. McDonald, president of the Eastern Oregon and Washington Fireman's association returned from Walla Walla Monday afternoon, holding a conference with Director J. W. Morgan as to the plans to be carried out by the association for the coming year. It was decided not to hold an election this coming June and to let the business of the association run along for another year. Walla Walla is out, as no paid fire department can be a member. La Grande and Heppner being so far away from this section makes it necessary that they drop out. While nothing definite will be done this year, it is the desire of Mr. McDonald to form a new league made up of towns in eastern Washington, leaving out Oregon altogether. Walla Walla now has the cup, and as she cannot compete for it again, President McDonald will order it sent to him and he will hold it here until the next contest.—Davton Dispatch.

Sleep While Parents Die.

Kansas City, May 21.—Fred Latty, a laborer, and his wife were found in their home at Independence, near here, early today, with their throats cut. The woman was dead, and Latty was in a dying condition, and so weak from loss of blood that he could not talk. A

bloody razor lay on the floor. Mrs. Latty had threatened suicide, and it is believed that after she had killed herself Latty tried to end his life. The couple were found by one of their children, three of whom had slept through the tragedy in an adjoining room.

Montana Blizzards Kill a Million Sheep.

Butte, Mont., May 22.—A Helena, Mont., special to the Inner Mountain says statistics compiled by President T. C. Power of the state board of sheep commissioners fixes the total number of sheep lost in the recent blizzard as 900,000. Up to the time of the storm 600,000 had frozen in the snow previous to the blizzards making the grand total of 1,500,000 lost in Montana since December. At an average of \$2.50 this means a monopoly loss of \$3,750,000.

The figures are official, being based on tables compiled from special reports compiled and audited by J. A. Ferguson, state commissioner of labor and agriculture, and Assistant Secretary of State Marks.
