AWFUL MINE EXPLOSION

Snuffed Out the Lives of 236
of the Miners.

FIRE DAMP WAS THE CAUSE

Vast Destruction of Property and
Scores Who Were Not Killed
Were Injured.

HANNA, Wyo., June 30.—At 10:30 a.
m. today an explosion of fire damp in
mine No. 1 of the Union Pacific Coal
Company snuffed out the lives of 236
men, injured scores of others, and caused
the destruction of a vast amount of
property. The explosion was terrific,
and completely shattered the timbers of
the main shaft and numerous entrances,
filled the workings with debris, and
those of the miners that were not killed
outright by the explosion were buried
alive.

At Oyster Bay to Rest.

Oyster Bay, L. I., June 28.—President
Roosevelt passed a quiet Sunday with
his family at his Sagamore Hill home.
During the afternoon, some relatives and
personal friends called to extend their
greeting to the President and his family.
The President, accompanied by Mrs.
Roosevelt and their children, attended
services this morning at Christ Church,
of which Mrs. Roosevelt is a member.
At the conclusion of the service the
members of the parish paid their respects
to the Chief Executive.

It is announced by Secretary Loeb
that the President will receive few call-
ers at Sagamore Hill this Summer, and
those who hope to see him will be
obliged to make engagements through
Mr. Loeb in advance of their arrival at
Oyster Bay. The President will devote
his mornings to the transaction of exec-
utive business and his afternoons to re-
creation and rest. During the afternoons,
too, he will receive such callers as may
have engagements with him or those
whom he may summon to Sagamore Hill.

The executive offices selected for Sec-
retaries Loeb and Barnes and the cler-
ical force this year are much more com-
modious and convenient than those oc-
cupied last year. They consist of six
rooms in the second story of the Moore
Block, and are well arranged and admir-
ably adapted to the purposes of the ex-
ecutive staff. The desks and other furni-
ture in the offices are chiefly those which
were used in the executive offices of the
old White House.

President Roosevelt will spend no time
in the offices, his work being done in his
library at Sagamore Hill. The offices
are in direct communication by tele-
phone with Sagamore Hill.

STOP TO LAND ENTRY.

Walla Walla District Desert Lands
Withdrawn.

Walla Walla, Wash., June 26.—An
order for the withdrawal from desert en-
try of 1,100,000 acres of land in the Wal-
la Walla Land Office district was receiv-
ed here today from the Department of
the Interior. The withdrawn district
comprises:

All of Franklin County, Washington.
Portions of ten townships along the
Snake River, in Walla Walla County.
Ten townships at the southwestern
corner of Adams County.

A small portion of Yakima County.

The supposed object of the withdrawal
is to investigate the possibilities for Gov-
ernment irrigation in this district from
the Snake and Columbia Rivers. The

order came as a complete surprise. A
few months ago a Government surveying
party prospected the entire country along
the Snake from Riparia to Pasco, and
the order is known to come as a result
of its recommendation to the depart-
ment.

Japanese Crowd Chinese Out.

Honolulu, June 20, via San Francisco,
June 26.—The last report of a commer-
cial agency contains a comment on a
recent Chinese failure on the Island of
Kauai, in which it is stated that the
large Chinese business men are leaving
the island. According to the report,
they are being gradually crowded out of
the field by Japanese competitors.

A libel against the barkentine James
Tuft for \$20,000 has been filed in the
United States District Court by one of
the crew, who claims to have received
serious injuries on the trip here from
Newcastle. The injuries are alleged to
have been the result of the breaking
loose of a spar, which was not properly
fastened.

The Merchants' Association has drafted
a memorial to the War Department,
asking that Honolulu be again made a
port of call for the San Francisco-Manila
transports.

Horses For Alberta.

LaGrande, Or., June 26.—A company
of horsebuyers from Alberta, Canada,
who have been in this country for sever-
al weeks, were today receiving horses
at the O. R. & N. yards. The buyers
are T. D. Stickle, and U. E. Waller, of
Calgary; J. W. Day, of Medicine Hat,
and S. Derinzy, of McLeod.

They received here 17 carloads of all
grades of horses and six from Elgin,
there being about 700 head in all. Prices
ranged from \$10 for some colts to \$125
for heavy horses. In all about \$21,000
was paid out, of which \$17,000 went to
horsemen here.

The shipment will go to Spokane, re-
main one day for feeding, go to Cut
Bark, Mont., and be driven from there
to McLeod, a distance of 200 miles. The

horses will be kept for a time at McLeod,
and will be sold out as rapidly as possi-
ble to the many new settlers in Alberta
and Assiniboia. Should the venture
prove a success, the gentlemen may re-
turn this Fall for more. They will have
to pay over \$2000 in freight and \$4000 in
duty. Nearly every band of horses here
supplied a few.

Oregon Back From Nome.

Seattle, June 25.—The steamship Ore-
gon, the first vessel to reach this city
from Nome since the close of navigation
last season, tied up at the dock at 2:20
this afternoon. She brought no news of
importance later than has already been
received overland to Dawson and thence
by wire. She reported no mishaps and
a pleasant voyage. She brought 35 pas-
sengers and \$140,000 in gold.

Roosevelt Pardons Three Filipinos.

Washington, June 26.—The President
has pardoned three Filipinos—Pedro
Santos, convicted before a military com-
mission for violating the laws of war and
for murder, and Jose Atienza and Felix
Atienza, also convicted before military
commissions of murder and of being
guerrillas.

These pardons are recommended by
Governor Taft, by the General com-
manding the division of the Philippines,
and by the Secretary of War, for the
reason that the offenses grew out of the
insurrection, were committed during it,
and because the amnesty proclamation
of the President, dated July 4, 1902, did
not cover the cases of these prisoners.
