Wool movements are much slower this year than last. Eastern merchants have not bought as readily. For the reason of the backward movement, the American Wool and Cotton Reporter says: In the first place, the wools have been late in coming upon the market. Cold and rainy weather and late storms have operated to delay shearing. Secondly, the prices at which many of the wools have been held, have been above those which eastern merchants considered that they were warranted in paying, in view of the very dull condition of the seaboard markets, and the very quiet demand from manufacturers. The latter, except those making certain lines of woollens and dress goods, have had anything but a successful season. The worsted men's wear mills have not received the orders which they had hoped for and a good many looms have been idle. Consumers, therefore, have naturally bought very sparingly of wools, and the course of prices in the eastern markets until recently has been towards a lower instead of a higher level. Dealers in wool, therefore, have hesitated in paying to the growers prices which were in many instances two cents per pound above those asked a year ago, unless for exceptionally well conditioned and light shrinkage wools.
