Gambling Checks Void.

Olympia, Wash., July 30 .- The Supreme Court today decided that bank checks issued for money advanced for the purpose of gambling are void. The decision was in the Spokane County case, of Archie S. Nash, appellant, vs. Charlotte Clarke, executrix of the estate of James Clarke, deceased, respondent. Nash hought two checks, amounting to \$150 from a gambler named Green. The checks were signed by Clarke, and were naid in at Green's gambling game, but before payment there of Clarke died and Nash brought suit against his executrix to collect on them. 


