The new bridge across the John Day river on the Long Creek road has been completed by the contractors, Dixon & Fields, and was accepted last Saturday by Judge McHaley and Commissioner Brown. It is said to be the best wooden bridge in Grant county.—Blue Mountain Eagle.

The cattle market has somewhat improved the last week in this county. T. C. Benson, buyer for the Union Meat Co, and W. F. Courtney, of Walla Walla were receiving Monday and drove out quite large bunches. The price is based on \$3.25 per hundred delivered at Elgin, which is from \$5 to \$7 per head for three year old steers less than was received last year. The buyers are very choicy in their selections and are making heavy cuts.—Wallowa Chieftain.

Kiddle brothers of Island City are receiving 2000 head of hogs at different points in Wallowa county. About 400 of the number are fat hogs, while the balance are feeders, which they will drive to Island City and intermediate points to fatten. The price paid was four cents for feeders and four and one half cents for fat hogs. The price of wheat and all other grains is so high in this county this fall that the farmers are selling off their stock hogs rather than feed them and take chances on the future market. Wheat is now selling at the mills for 75 cents per bushel.

STOCK NOTES.

Sheep Beginning to Move—Cattle Being Fed.

So far this fall the sheep market has been very quiet. The shortage of grass and somewhat limited supply of hay on hand early in the season has had a marked effect on the market:

During the past week the following transactions are reported:

W. E. Hand, of Galloway, sold 340 mixed lambs to Wm. Hoskins, of the same place for \$1.50 per head.

D. O. Justus purchased 1200 head of mixed lambs from S. W. Spencer for \$1.50 per head.

James Carty, of Tub Springs has been stocking up his bands. He bought 1800 head of lambs from the John Woodward and J. L. Ayers bands this week for \$1.50 per head. He also purchased 600 lambs from Harry Jones at \$1.50, and 1000 yearling wethers from Nat Webb for \$2 per head.

Sunday last, Kilcup brothers drove 2000 head of sheep through this city on their way to the home ranch on Butter creek. The sheep were purchased from James McHaley.

Monday, John Kinsman shipped two cars of fat cattle to the Union Meat Company, Portland.

D. O. Justus, of Heppner, commenced to feed 180 head of beef cattle, Saturday. The cattle are in good condition to start with and will soon be ready for market.
