Newspaper reports have it that Hearst will start a paper in Portland. If he does it will be many years from now.

Strangers coming to Eastern Oregon at this time of year are all very much impressed with the beautiful weather. The fall season is simply grand in the Inland Empire.

D. R. N. Blackburn, ex-Attorney General of Oregon, who died at Albany recently, was an able and prominent man. He leaves a very large circle of friends throughout the state.

Evidences of the flood as far as the looks of the town are concerned, are gradually wearing away in Heppner. Sidewalks are being replaced, many new buildings are being finished and nor-

mal conditions are being assumed. This has been a very busy fall and an increased volume of business is reported in all lines.

The hundred or more Oregon editors who met in Salem last week and had a big time, never complained anything about Salem's bad water. Disease germs in water did not bother this crowd.

The Good Roads Association has endorsed the proposition of the employment of convicts for making roads. This may work all right but there is all kinds of room for an argument on the feasibility of the scheme.

The recent meeting of the Good Roads Association worked up considerable enthusiasm and passed some very good resolutions if nothing more. The sum of \$3,000 is asked for to carry out the work of the organization. The employment of convicts for road work was endorsed, and an appropriation of \$100,000 urged from Congress for the office of Public Road Inquiries, in order that objection roads may be constructed in all the states.

CARE OF INDIANS.

Statistics show that the Indians are well cared for in the United States. From the appearance of the roving bands that are common in Eastern Oregon, looks would hardly bear out this statement, but most of the roving bands belong to a class who try to shift for themselves in living in a wild state against the battle of civilization.

Indian reservations in this country cover a territory equal to that of all the New England states, New York, New Jersey, and half of Pennsylvania. The states enumerated contain a population of about 18,000,000 people, while there are only about 250,000 Indians for an equal amount of territory.

Then, the Indians have \$240,000,000 in the government vaults, an amount which, divided per capita among those who receive it, makes them the wealthiest people on earth. They have the most elaborate school system ever devised by a nation for its wards, and in showing a willingness to do everything to help the Indian to

live comfortably and make a man of himself the government is without a rival.

For smashing records by harness horses, this season has already eclipsed all previous years, in fact it has become almost a weekly occurrence. Dan Patch has clipped three quarters of a second from the wonderful pacing record made by Prince Alert of 1:57 flat, and now comes Lou Dillon, the queen of the turf, with a mile to her credit in 1:58½. This is the second time that this wonderful mare has broken the trotting record this year.

Judge John H. Scott, president of the Oregon Good Roads Society, has been appointed delegate from the State of Oregon to attend the coming session of congress, to work for the passage of the Brownlow bill, which provided for the improvement of country roads by the national government.
