NEW CURE FOR CONSUMPTION.

German Physician Declares That
Eucalyptus Fumes Will De-
stroy the Disease Germs.

A remedy claimed by its inventor as an entirely new treatment for consumption is attracting the attention of lung specialists at Berlin and the medical profession generally. It consists of the inhalation of vapor produced by heating a mixture of eucalyptus oil, sulphur and charcoal, and it is stated that it is more effective than any serum remedy hitherto tried.

Robert Schneider, a druggist, of Berlin, conceived the idea while traveling in parts of Australia, where the eucalyptus tree grows luxuriantly. Consumption is almost unknown among the inhabitants of these districts and suffers from the disease who go there improve speedily. Herr Schneider upon returning to Berlin communicated his idea to Dr. Sommerfeld, a physician of high repute, who experimented in hospitals for six months. As a result 60 of 100 patients treated by him were completely cured. The inhalation of the vapor kills the bacilli. In some cases the patients were kept in an atmosphere impregnated with the fumes night and day until they showed signs of relief. Dr. Sommerfeld will read a paper on the subject before the Berlin Medical society at the end of April, claiming that the new curative agent, which is called Sanosin, constitutes an enormous advance in the treatment of tuberculosis.

WIRELESS SYSTEM ON SHIPS.

The American Line of Steamers to
Install Apparatus on Several
of Its Steamers.

The American line, which has had for some time the Marconi wireless telegraph system in operation on the steamship Philadelphia, has issued a handsomely illustrated circular showing cuts of the Marconi station and of the St. Louis at sea, announcing its determination to equip the St. Louis, the St. Paul and the New York at once with the system.

In addition to the facilities offered to passengers in the way of sending or receiving telegrams while at sea arrangements have been made with news companies for supplying current news, which will be sent by wireless telegraphy to east-bound steamers from the Poldhu station, on the coast of England, and to west-bound steamers from the Siasconset station, Nantucket. The steamers of the lines when fitted with the wireless telegraph apparatus will be practically in continuous communication with either shore stations or with passing steamers.

SHADOW EXPERT ENGRAVER.

Care Which is Taken When a New
Seal of the United States is to
Be Engraved.

Secret service operatives will shortly arrive at Philadelphia to shadow Max Zeitler, an expert heraldic engraver. Not that Mr. Zeitler has done wrong, but he is about to recut the great seal of the United States, and the government during this process employs a greater force of inspectors to keep an eye on the single workman than in the construction of a \$5,000,000 battleship.

The firm to which the contract for the seal has been let was compelled to name the engraver when it bid for the work. This exactness is required so that the necessary protection may be afforded to the design which is expected from Washington in a few days for the guidance of the engraver. The new seal also will be carefully guarded. The present seal has become so worn by years of constant use that the new one will be completed to replace it as soon as possible.

TELEPHONES FOR PATIENTS.

Philadelphia Hospital Makes It Possible
for Sick Ones to Visit
with Distant Friends.

Within a day or two it will be possible for a patient in the Methodist hospital in Philadelphia to talk from their beds with relatives or friends outside of the institution, and to receive messages directly from those who, for various reasons, might be debarred from calling in person.

This will be accomplished by the installation of a new telephone system connecting each building, ward and private room in the hospital. When the system is in use, a patient whose condition does not prohibit his participating the benefits of the scheme may converse freely with anyone who is in touch with a telephone, either in the city or at points hundreds of miles away.

Exactly So.

REVENUE FROM SEA.

Business of Salt Water Fisheries of
Middle Atlantic States.

What the Returns of Six Principal
States Show Regarding the
Catch—Some Interesting
Particulars.

At a time of year when more fish is consumed than at any other season a few facts concerning the industry of supplying the market with that article of diet are not without interest. The United States commissioner of fisheries, George M. Bowers, recently issued a report on the value of the catch for a year along the coast of six states—New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland and Virginia. Though the scope of this survey is comparatively limited, it nevertheless embraces details which will probably be new to many readers. The figures are those of 1901, but to a great extent they are probably representative of other years, reports the New York Tribune.

The largest amount of money paid by the dealers to the fishermen is for oysters. No less than \$9,129,992 went for these bivalves, to say nothing of \$1,156,504 for seed oysters. The amount first mentioned is only a little over half of the total valuation (at wholesale rates) of the salt water fisheries for a year. Clams yielded \$1,074,834, that sum being divided in the proportion of about nine to one between hard and soft shell clams. Shad, however, ranked next after oysters, having cost the markets \$1,253,197. Menhaden, which are converted into oil and fertilizers, and do not find a place on the table, took the fourth place in the procession, being credited with \$987,228, while bluefish brought \$759,152, weakfish \$558,209, crabs (hard and soft) \$195,385, alewives (fresh and salted) \$262,352, white perch \$154,239, eels, \$152,686, butterfish \$149,984, sea bass \$126,668, cod \$119,590, flounders \$111,775, and scallops \$110,537. Of course, the amounts of certain fish (cod, for instance) caught along the Middle Atlantic coast do not correspond with the consumption in the same region, because large quantities are brought from New England. Halibut, one of the staples of the fish trade, does not appear in Commissioner Bowers' tables at all.

Inasmuch as the weights, as well as the value, of each kind of fish caught are mentioned, it is an easy matter to figure out the average price in every instance. Thus menhaden sold at one-fifth of a cent a pound, alewives at four-fifths, sea bass at 2 cents, weakfish at 2 1/2, cod at 3, common mackerel and shad at 4, bluefish at 4 1/2, whitebait at 7, sheepshead at 8, Spanish mackerel and scallops at 9, striped bass at nearly 10, lobsters at 12, terrapin at 40 and shrimps at 50 cents a pound.

Locality has something to do with prices, however, either because of differences in quality or differences in demand. Thus, New York and New Jersey shad brought only a fraction over 3 cents, and the Virginia product only 2, while that of Delaware and Pennsylvania commanded 4 and 4 1/2 cents, respectively. Again, striped bass from Maryland sold for 8 cents, and that from New York for 13. Even more striking inequalities are afforded by the returns for terrapin. Those produced in Virginia averaged less than 30 cents, Maryland 75, New Jersey a trifle over 40 cents, and New York's (only 340 pounds), \$1. What is practically a parallel case is found in the figures for oysters. Virginia produced 42,473,663 pounds and Maryland 39,798,927, but as the former sold only 6 cents a pound and the latter for 7 1/2, Maryland received the more money. In the meantime New York sold her 12,380,921 pounds for nearly 14 cents a pound.
