New Irrigation Company.

Articles of incorporation were filed in the office of the county clerk at Pendleton Wednesday by T. B. Van Cleve, H. C. Rogers, Charles McBee, B. L. Sheri dan and R. B. Stanfield, creating the Butter Creek Irrigation Company, with a capital stock of \$5000, divided into 500 shares of \$10 each.

The principal place of business of the company will be located at Echo, and it declares its intention of taking the waters of the Umatilla river and its tributaries for domestic and irrigating purposes, and for the furnishing of power and the watering of stock in dry pastures and other general uses.

The company will construct ditches, dams and reservoirs, and will convey the water over the land. It will also operate telephone and telegraph lines and power stations, will generate electricity for lighting and other purposes, and will reclaim arid lands in the vicini ty of the location of the property of the hurt. company.




