Mr. McBee states that there are now about 4000 head of beef cattle being fed on alfalfa in the Butter creek valley, this being about 1000 less than last year. The fact that hay in the stack is selling for \$8 per ton is the principal cause for the shortage of beef feeders. Mr. McBee says that if the winter should be severe, that the price of hay would be out of all reason by spring.

CATTLE MARKET DULL.
Buyers are Scarce and Little Doing Among Cattlemen.

R. J. Carsner and J. M. Gates of Spray, were in the city Friday. They came in with a shipment of fifty-two head of beef cattle. The cattle went to Gresham, where they were purchased by a local butcher.

In speaking of stock conditions in the Spray country Mr. Carsner said that the outlook was not flattering for the cattle-men. Under ordinary conditions the stockmen have enough hay to feed through the winter, but the market is bad. Compared with previous years conditions are not encouraging. Buyers are very scarce and it is a hard matter to turn off anything. There are quite a number of yearlings for sale, but the best offers have been \$15 per head, while the owners are holding for \$16. For the same cattle owners were offered \$18 this spring, but at that time they were holding for \$20.

In the Spray country the Gilman & French cattle, consisting of 5000 head, are ranged. They have about 1000 head of yearlings.
