CIRCUIT COURT.

Business of Regular Term Being Disposed Of.

Judge W. R. Ellis convened circuit court in this city Monday.

There were two criminal and twenty-two civil cases.

The case of V. T. Jones, charged with larceny, was dismissed on motion of the district attorney.

The case of Mike Doyle, who was indicted for assault with a dangerous weapon, was postponed to allow the prisoner time to plead. He was placed under \$400 bonds, which he was unable to furnish and he was placed in the county jail, to await trial, which will probably come up at the adjourned term of court in December.
