CURE FOR CONSUMPTION.

Russian Physician Is Having Remarkable Success.

Moscow, Nov. 19.—Remarkable cures of consumption have recently been effected in Russia by Kisel Zagoranski, formerly a mining engineer, and now especially licensed by the Russian medical department to practice medicine. Zagoranski has given the Associated Press an account of the origin of his consumption cure, from which it appears that 30 years ago he was sent to Siberia to superintend extensive mining works. The medical facilities there were extremely limited, and Zagoranski himself attended to the medical wants of the workmen to the best of his ability.

An old foreman of the mine, however, always took care of consumption cases, and almost invariably cured them. The foreman died some years ago, confiding his tuberculosis cure to Zagoranski, who continued to use it.

Hearing a rumor that John D. Rockefeller, of the United States, had offered an immense prize for the discovery of a consumption cure, he consulted American Consul Smith, who, with his brother, W. E. Smith, began a systematic observation of the cases of several patients, and especially that of an English lady, an acquaintance of the consul, who had been given up by the doctors. She submitted to Zagoranski's treatment, which was given under professional medical observation. This occurred last spring, and the cure appears to be permanent.

Scope of Rockefeller Work.

New York, Nov. 19.—In connection with dispatches from Moscow announcing the discovery of a consumption cure by Kisel Zagoranski, a Siberian mining engineer, who hopes to win the prize offered by John D. Rockefeller, it is recalled that consumption is only one of the subjects of investigation which comes within the scope of the Rockefeller Institute of Medical Research. The plans for the institute were made public early in the year, and already they have taken practical shape under a board of directors.

Mr. Rockefeller gave an initial gift of \$500,000 for pathological research in pursuance of a scheme which he began to formulate more than two years ago. He selected a number of scientists to work out his plans and 17 months ago he replaced the sum of \$1,000,000 at the disposal of the board for immediate use, and the execution of the entire scheme may mean the outlay of ten times that sum from Mr. Rockefeller's gifts. Some portion of the funds have already been

devoted to fellowships, which have been placed in universities all over the country.

The headquarters of the institute will be in this city.

Come Within the Law.

The new inheritance tax law provides that all estates appraised at \$10,000 or over are subject to taxation. The question has arisen whether an \$11,000 estate, in which only \$4,000 worth of the property is located in Oregon, comes within the provisions of the law. Or, in other words, if the estate in Oregon is valued at less than \$10,000 and the entire estate, parts of which are located in various parts of the country, is appraised at \$10,000 or more, is the property in Oregon subject to taxation under the inheritance tax law?

An opinion expressed by numerous attorneys is that if an estate amounts to \$10,000, or more, and only a portion of the property is in Oregon, the Oregon property is liable to taxation under the law.

Under the new law the county clerk sends a list of all estates filed to the state treasurer and secretary of state and also notifies these officers when inventories are filed and the amount of the same. Executors and administrators, where estates are appraised at \$10,000, are required by the law to send a copy of the inventory to the secretary of state who, having been previously informed by the county clerk, knows if any executor or administrator fails to conform to the law.

If estates where the property in Oregon is less than \$10,000 and where there is enough property situated elsewhere to make up the difference, are made to pay the tax, the revenue received by the state will be increased considerably, as there are not a few of such cases.

The statute was carefully prepared so that the tax cannot be evaded by people transferring their holdings by deed to relatives, the deed to take effect after death. The records in the recorder's office are watched for deeds by one member of a family to another where the consideration named is nominal or love and affection, to ascertain whether the intent is to escape the inheritance tax.

Carrie Nation Goes to Jail.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 19.—Carrie Nation, the first and only Queen of Joint Smashers, created a big sensation here today by invading the White House and demanding an audience with President Roosevelt. She was admitted to Secretary Loeb's office and was shown such courtesy as is always given to prospective interviewers with the president; but after waiting for half an hour the Kansas crusader became intolerably impatient, and proceeded to enter the president's office in defiance of the secretaries' entreaties. Thereupon officers were summoned and the bellicose woman forcibly ejected. She then went to the capitol and created a disturbance in the senate chamber.

When she first entered the august statesmen seemed to have a predilection of what was going to happen, and fearing lest she would get busy with her little hatchet, they made a stampede towards the doors. The officers were immediately called and she was placed under arrest, fined \$25 and given 30 days in jail.

She swears eternal vengeance on the president and the officers, and she declares the turndown she was given was too much to be pardoned.

A heavily armed, irresponsible crank tried to gain access to Governor Peabody at Denver, Saturday last. There is little doubt that he meant murder. He was taken in custody.

Will Gridiron Alaska.

San Francisco, Nov. 19.—J. Warren Dickson, vice-president and general manager of the Western Alaska Construction company, says that company is to build into the richest mining section of the world.

The company has now in course of construction the Council City & Solomon River railroad, which extends from tide water at Solomon City, Alaska, 28 miles from Nome, to Council City, a distance of 50 miles. In discussing railroad building in the far north, Mr. Dickson said the company he represents purposes building a large system of railroads there.

Its plan is to gridiron Alaska in order that the country may be developed. He stated that the road is passing through the richest territory in the world. Discussing the situation, Mr. Dickson said:

"We have 52 miles of general construction material on hand. We are shipping millions of ties into the country, and by next summer we intend pushing the work with great rapidity. Our company is incorporated for \$1,000,000 and has no stock for sale."

More Room for Holy Rollers.

Corvallis, Or., Nov. 19.—In order better to accommodate the worshippers known as the Holy Rollers, the cottage of O. V. Hurt will be enlarged and renovated. The work has already commenced and is being performed by the 20 or more disciples of Apostle Creffield, who are quartered in the home at present. For the time being the nightly seances seem to have been discontinued and the neighbors are again able to enjoy night in peace and quiet.

O. V. Hurt, whose home has been thrown open to the "chosen few," has gone to Portland, and from there he expects to go on a visit to relatives in the east. He will also look after an estate in which he is interested.

Away from the influence of other members of this sect Mr. Hurt talks and acts as reasonably as any one. He claims that nearly everything that was destroyed by fire at his home was utterly worthless, and was burned merely for sanitary purposes. He admits, however, that valuable property might have been destroyed without his knowledge, as he was absent during the burning.

The Railway World finds the industrial growth of the south very remarkable. It was "unprecedented" in the year ended June 30, 1902, but in the twelve months following it was much greater. On the southern railway lines "the capital invested in traffic-producing industries" during the year ended June 30, 1903, was greater by 17 per cent than in the previous year. The character of the new enterprises was changed. In 1902 purchases of premises and erection of factory buildings constituted the chief investments, but in 1903 the investments were predominantly in equipment designed to increase output. Mines, mills and factories were enlarged and improved, with the result of an increased product and increased traffic of the railways. "During this last year," says the World, "the increased investment in coal mines, iron mines, lumber mills, wood working plants and other closely related interests, which are the produc-

ers of the largest tonnage, was even more marked than in other classes of industrial enterprises." President Spencer, of the Southern railway, is quoted as expecting a congestion of traffic in the south consequent upon the increased requirements of industrial enterprises. "This congestion," it is added, "is more or less general throughout the country; but in the south, where the industrial awakening has been relatively the greatest in a short space of time, the situation has been more difficult to forecast and to reasonably provide for than in other sections where industrial changes have been more gradual."
