Work will soon be commenced on another substantial business building in Heppner. The sound of the carpenter's hammer is heard everywhere. Winter weather does not seem to have any effect on building operations.

It is now positively announced that Senator Marcus A. Hanna is a candidate for the presidency against Roosevelt. Hanna is a strong man, but Roosevelt is stronger. While a certain element including Wall street is opposed to the president and will work hard for Hanna or any other man to defeat Roosevelt, it will be hard to defeat the wishes of a great majority of the people.

A special session of the legislature has been called by Governor Chamberlain to convene on December 21. Already there is considerable talk of legislation outside of the correction of the tax law, and it is very likely that the law makers will be engaged for several days. The repeal of the \$300 exemption will probably come up, and also the portage railway appropriation and possibly other questions of legislation.

Representative Johnson, of Grant county, the father of the bill to appropriate \$165,000 for a portage railway at Celilo, now favors the repeal of this measure, for the reason that there is a prospect of the federal government taking

hold of the matter and building a canal. With Mr. Johnson favoring the repeal of his own bill, the fight over right-of-way and a special session of the legislature in sight, it certainly looks blue for the portage railway appropriation.

Coal at \$8.75 a ton and wood at \$7 a cord is a problem that becomes impressive as winter approaches. While there is no remedy for this now, this is a condition that will not last much longer. The Willow creek coal mines will soon be furnishing us with cheap fuel in unlimited supply.

The importance of mining in the United States can be realized when statistics show results. During the calendar year 1902, this country produced \$80,000,000 in gold and \$71,757,575 in silver, making a grand total of \$151,757,575. Among the states producing this output, Oregon comes ninth in the list with \$1,937,033 to her credit. While these figures are large, the production of wealth from the mines will continue to grow larger, being increased by the many new properties that are being opened up. In Oregon, the mining industry has great room for growth, for great treasures lie hidden in the earth awaiting development by capital.

The public was treated to a genuine surprise when a few weeks ago a Kansas veteran asked that his name be stricken from the pension rolls on the ground that he no longer needed aid. It is pretty safe to say that his example is not likely to be followed to any considerable extent by wealthy pensioners. Officials of the pension bureau, having had exceptionally good opportunity to study human

nature, do not expect a material reduction of the pension list to follow this case. The idea advanced is contrary both to the theory and practice of modern pension laws. The disability or need of the recipient has long since been expunged from the pension demand.—Ex.

The month that passes without heralding a new cure for consumption is an exceptional one in this era of strenuous effort in the realm of medical science. The latest of these cures is heralded, not by a physician or a bacteriologist, but by a Russian mining engineer, Zagoranski, to whom the secret was bequeathed by an old foreman in the mines of Siberia, who is said to have tested it upon Siberian exiles for years with the most satisfactory results. How much the bracing air of that section and the outdoor life of the subjects had to do in rendering the cures efficacious can only be known when the remedy is tried in other localities. Zagoranski will try to secure the prize which he had heard was offered by John D. Rockefeller for the cure of consumption, before divulging the nature of his remedy. The Rockefeller prize was not offered for the cure of consumption alone, but for pathological research along various lines; it is not doubted, however, that satisfactory demonstration of the cure of consumption will be munificently rewarded. Moreover, a humane man in possession of such a secret would find it impossible to withhold it long from the pale host that would come to him for relief. If the Siberian cure is genuine it will not long remain a secret. The world has advanced too far in the humanities to permit that.—Oregonian.
