Invitations are out for a social dance in Roberts' hall Friday evening. It goes without saying that it will be a success.
Rev. John Warren wishes to announce that there will be no services in the Episcopal Mission next Sunday, in Heppner.
Miss Maria Maddock and Dr. J. F. Wood, of Condon, were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. S. E. VanVactor this week.
The Baptist church has recently been repainted on the inside and the rostrum changed, so that it now presents a very neat appearance.
J. H. McHaley brought in 28 head of cattle from Hamilton Saturday. They were taken off the grass and were in fine

County Judge T. W. Ayers was out several days over Morrow county this week, inspecting roads and looking after the work of the county roadmaster.
A. P. Bradbury, the popular traveling man with the Pacific Coast Biscuit Co., arrived in Heppner Tuesday evening. He was seized with a stroke of paralysis Tuesday night and was taken to Portland Wednesday morning.
W. O. Minor this week sold to Milt Morgan, of Spray, Lovely's Chief, a fine shorthorn bull. This animal was sired by Strathallan Chief, for which Mr. Minor paid \$1000, and the dam was Lovely of the Valley, a cow that cost \$1100. Mr. Morgan is grading up his stock and is buying the best strains to do it with.
The prompt acquittal of Asa B. Thomson, receiver of the La Grande office, who was charged with soliciting bribes was received with much enthusiasm by Mr. Thomson's many friends in Morrow county. The prosecution failed to establish a single fact in the charges preferred and the whole affair was mighty dirty business. Death of a Pioneer.

Mrs. Julia Wright died at her home in Heppner, Wednesday, Dec. 9th, aged 75 years 1 month and 17 days.
Mrs. Wright was born in New York, October 22, 1828, and crossed the plains in 1853, and settled in Clackamas county, Oregon, near Oregon City. After living there 20 years, she moved to Eastern Oregon in 1873, and settled in Morrow county, where she has since resided. The deceased lived an exemplary life and was loved and respected by all who knew her. Her work here on earth is ended, but the good deeds she has done will live forever. Mrs. Wright has been a member of the M. E. church all her life and was a devout Christian.
She raised a family of six children, five of whom survive her: Mrs. Julia W. Bisbee, S. W., Geo. E., A. E. Wright, Mrs. Eda J. Gilliam; and Mrs. Mary David, deceased. Mr. Albert Wright, husband of the deceased, is also left to mourn his wife's death. We cannot imagine anything sadder than when the chain is broken between husband and wife, who have struggled together for years and worked in harmony through trials and tribulations.
The funeral services were held in the M. E. church this afternoon at 2 p. m.
