DATES NAMED.

Meeting of Democratic County Central Committee.

The democratic county central committee met at the parlors of the Palace hotel yesterday afternoon.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Henry Blackman at 2 o'clock, Secretary L. L. Matlock being present to record the proceedings.

There was a good attendance, a large portion of the precincts of Morrow county being represented by the committeemen and by proxy.

As there is only a small amount of business to be transacted at meetings of this kind, the meeting was a short one, everything passing off in harmony and in short order as a matter of routine.

The first order of business suggested by the Chairman was the apportionment of delegates. By unanimous sentiment as was expressed by the meeting, the apportionment was based on the vote cast for Governor Geo. E. Chamberlain at the last election. The apportionment is as follows:

One delegate at large for each precinct and one delegate for each 15 votes or major fraction thereof cast for governor. With this apportionment the democratic county convention will consist of 58 delegates, and the number from each precinct will be found in the call for the convention in another column of this paper.

By motion the date of the primaries was fixed for Saturday, March 26, and the county convention will be held on Saturday, April 2.

As a result of the Turner art exhibit, the women of Dallas have raised \$75 for the purchase of pictures for the public schools.

CALL FOR A REPUBLICAN CO. CONVENTION and Time for Holding Primaries.

The Morrow County Republican Convention is hereby called to meet at the Court House, Heppner, Oregon, at 10:30 a. m., on Saturday, March 19, 1904, for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for county officers, and to elect five delegates to represent Morrow County at the Republican State and Congressional Conventions to be held in Portland, April 13th and 14th, 1904.

The Primaries of Morrow County will be held from 1 to 3 o'clock p. m., on Saturday, March 12.

The apportionment of delegates to the county convention will be based on the vote for Judge Bean at last election, one delegate at large for each precinct and one for every 15 voters or fraction over one half.

The place for holding the primaries in North Ione shall be at M. S. Maxwell's office; in South Ione at Walker's Hall; in Matteson at Gilliam & Bisbee's warehouse, corner of May and Chase streets, Heppner, Oregon, and in the other precincts at the usual voting places.

The Great Southern railroad has been incorporated in Seattle, for the purpose of building a branch road from The Dalles to Dufur, a distance of 15 miles in Wasco county.

The Portland Woolen Mills employes who were thrown out of work by the burning of the mills, will be employed by the Albany mills until the Portland mill are rebuilt.

L. N. Blowers, of Hood River, has been appointed deputy United States marshal to succeed A. L. Roberts, lately appointed receiver of the La Grande land office.

Seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars has been subscribed in Chicago for a music hall, which is to be made the home of a permanent orchestra.

The Canadian government is fixing up a scheme of military organization which calls for a regular army of 50,000 men, a "first line of defense" of 100,000 men, and a "second line of defense" of 100,000 men.

The Sante Fe railway will build from San Francisco to Eureka. From the preliminary survey to completion the road will cost \$12,000,000.

The Chicago Great Western railway has announced a cut in grain rates of 2 cents per hundred pounds from Missouri river points to Chicago.

HYDROPHOBIA REAL DISEASE.

Prominent Members of the Medical Profession Declare It to Be Such in Fact.

Despite the fact that denials have been made by various physicians of the existence of hydrophobia, several prominent members of the medical profession, at a meeting of the County Medical Society of the College of Physicians, declared that the disease has a "pathological entity" and should be so recognized, reports the Philadelphia Inquirer. Dr. G. Morton Ilman presented a paper entitled "A Report of a Case of Hydrophobia, with Autopsy." Dr. Ilman described the symptoms as exhibited in the case, and maintained that hydrophobia existed as a separate disease, with peculiar symptoms, and he asserted that it is a grave error to call it excessive hysteria, as has frequently been done. Dr. M. P. Ravenel, of the veterinary department of the university, said in discussing the subject: "I have personally experimented on 150 cases of animals which I have inoculated with the germs of rabies, and I found that the brain in each case showed the same symptoms, and those symptoms have been found in no other diseases."
