CITY COUNCIL.

Ordinance Requiring Fire Escapes Read First Time.

The city council met in regular session Monday evening with Mayor Gilliam presiding and a full board of councilmen present.

The petitions of McAtee & Swaggart, J. C. Borchers and Matlock Bros. for renewals of retail liquor licenses were granted.

A delayed bill against the Heppner relief committee for \$50 for expressage on cabbage which was received just after the flood was presented. As the relief committee is out of funds, having turned over what was left to the city, the council was asked to pay this bill out of the funds received. The request was granted.

The salary of \$20 a month to Frank Natter as custodian of the fire apparatus of Heppner, was ordered discontinued.

City Attorney C. E. Woodson presented ordinance No. 100, establishing a fire limit in Heppner. The ordinance was taken under advisement before going to first reading.

Ordinance No. 101, requiring public halls, hotels and lodging houses to be provided with fire escapes, was read first time.

School at Irrigon.

At the organization of the school district at Irrigon, Morrow county, Wednesday, the inhabitants of the hustling new town showed a proper gallantry by electing two of their directors from the ranks of the women.

At the election of officers, Mrs. W. H. Kinder, Mrs. George H. McQueen and Fred L. Mills were elected directors, and A. Bennett, clerk. The majority of the voting members of the board is composed of women and if they hang together the lone man on the board might as well look for another job.

Bonds to the amount of \$3,450 will be voted to build a two-room school house and F. B. Holbrook, superintendent of the Oregon Land & Water Company offered to donate to the district, free of charge, any site that may be selected by the board, on which to erect the building. Public school commenced on March 7, a private school having been in session for some time.

The cost of taking the first census was a little over 1 cent per head; that of the last census 17 cents.

PYTHIANS ENTERTAIN.

Doric Lodge Celebrates 40th Anniversary of Pythianism.

Doric Lodge No. 20, K. of P., celebrated the 40th anniversary of Pythianism, and also the 20th anniversary of the local lodge Tuesday evening.

For some time the gallant Knights and their ladies have been working to make this entertainment and banquet a success and that their efforts have been crowned with the desired result was demonstrated Tuesday evening.

About one hundred people were in attendance. The program which had been so carefully arranged was very entertaining.

Hon. G. W. Phelps who was billed to deliver the address of welcome, was suddenly called away on professional business just before the time to speak. While this caused considerable disappointment, it was entirely unavoidable on the part of Mr. Phelps, and this entertaining part of the program was omitted.

After music by the orchestra, the meeting was called to order by Hon. Henry Blackman, who presided, and welcomed the audience.

The song, "Until Dawn," by Messrs. Gove, O. Crawford, Hayes and V. Crawford, brought forth great applause, and was a combination of well trained voices that was very pleasing to the musical ear.

The address of Hon. W. R. Ellis, was one of the features of the entertainment. Mr. Ellis needs no introduction to a Heppner audience. Being an old resident of Heppner and a member of the great order which stands on the foundation of friendship, charity and benevolence, no one could have been better fitted for this occasion. He covered the ground, the intent and teachings of fraternal organizations, and with ease in his manner of speech showed that much good has resulted and can be attained through earnest devotion to the organizations where men are bound together in a common cause for the elevation and betterment of mankind. For half an hour he held the audience and in closing it commenced to dawn, he stated, that he had not had any dinner, even if his personal appearance did not bear out the statement that he had been fasting. He asked the audience to kindly overlook any unusual activity on his part in doing his duty at the banquet.

The song, "The City Choir," by a select choir was nicely rendered.

Another very pleasing feature of the program was an address by Hon. Henry Blackman on the early history of the order.

On giving the early history of Pythianism, no one in the State of Oregon is better qualified than Mr. Blackman. He is now the oldest Knight in Oregon, having joined one of the first Knight lodges instituted on the Pacific coast. He was initiated on December 11, 1869, in San Francisco before the advent of the order in the State of Oregon. This with the first organization and growth of the order to the present day, coupled with an interesting command of English, was very entertaining, and especially to the Knights. Mr. Blackman was highly complimented.

The always popular song "Old Kentucky Home," by the quartette was loudly applauded.

The reading by Miss Willa Minor was another interesting part of the program that well deserved the many congratulations and applause. Miss Minor's elocutionary training and with much talent and ability presented her selection with ease, and her delineations were real and impressive.

A song, "Old Black Joe," by the choir concluded the program, and preparations were immediately commenced for the banquet.

Three long tables were prepared in the banquet room of the hall, and the banquet was a grand one, reflecting great credit upon the Pythian ladies.

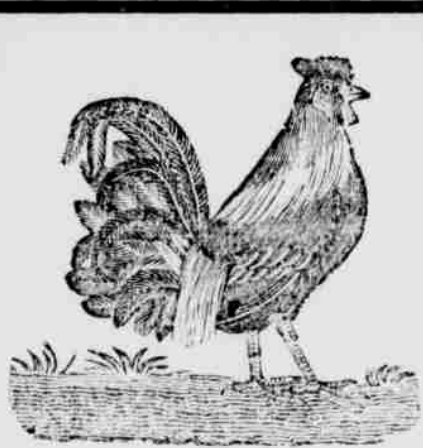
