THE REPUBLICAN TICKET.

The Republicans of Morrow county have met and have placed a county ticket in the field for the consideration of the voters. This ticket, taking it all the way through, is one that can be recommended and is a strong one and deserves victory at the polls.

The convention was composed of 62 delegates, all representative citizens of Morrow county, who have the best interests of the county at heart.

Notwithstanding the fact that a court house has been built, county roads have been looked after by a new and better system than in former years, which has added to the expense account, the county today is only about \$28,000 in debt, which shows that the reins of county government have been handled carefully and with good business judgment under Republican administration.

Taxes are not exorbitant and conditions are satisfactory, especially when compared with other counties of the state of Oregon.

The Republicans believe in a continuance of good government, and with this aim in view, were careful last Saturday in naming men for the various county offices who would receive and merit the confidence of the people.

The satisfactory condition of county affairs is strong argument for the Republican ticket. The showing in the past can be pointed to without fear. No just grounds of bad management can be substantiated. With the prevailing conditions there is no demand nor is there just cause for a change. A change might be as well, it might be much worse. There is no inducement for the conservative voter to take any chances.

Geo. J. Currin.
