Weekly Crop Bulletin.

U. S. Department of Agriculture, Climate and Crop Bulletin of the Weather Bureau, Oregon Section, for the week ending Tuesday, June 14.

GENERAL SUMMARY.

The week has been dry and too cool for rapid growth. Except in the coast counties and a few localities in the Willamette valley, rain is badly needed for late crops. Fall wheat and barley are heading nicely and promise good yields. Early sown wheat, barley and oats are also doing fairly well, but late grain of all kinds is making slow growth, and without timely rains will give unusually light returns. The nights have been too cool for corn. Frosts occurred on several mornings, but they did no harm

except east of the Cascades, where it is reported that tender vegetables were killed in a few exposed localities.

Haying is well started and the first crop of alfalfa has generally been secured, with yields above the average; but meadow hay is not so promising, and a short crop is indicated nearly everywhere in the Willamette valley and southern Oregon. Pasturage continues good on the ranges. Stock is in fine condition, and the flow of milk in the dairy districts is excellent.

Hops, potatoes; field onions, sugar beets and gardens are growing slowly, and, although in need of rain, have not yet suffered seriously for lack of moisture.

Herder Shot At.

The scene of the range war between cattlemen and sheepmen has been transferred to Wheeler county. Last Sunday a band of sheep were attacked by three masked men on the summit between Spray and Lonerock about three miles west of the Geo. Robison place. The sheep, however, were not injured, as the herder was the target of the outlaws who emerged from the woods heavily masked and when about 60 yards distant opened fire on the herder, who escaped without serious wounds, although his clothing was pierced in two places by the leaden messengers. The outlaws then retreated to the woods where they had left their horses and made

their escape.

The sheep belonged to Nat Wallace of Arlington, who was on his way to the Green Horn mountains for summer range.—Spray Courier.

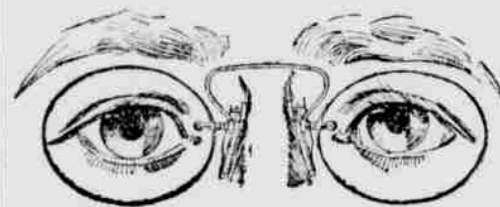

CONTEST NOTICE.

Department of the Interior, United States Land Office, LaGrande, Oregon, May 6, 1904. A sufficient contest affidavit having been filed in this office by George W. Swaggart, contestant, against homestead entry No. 1248, made January 12, 1903, for the sec. 24, n. 1/4, ne. 1/4, ne. 1/4, sec. 2, tp. 3 s., range 28 e. W. M., by Henry W. Bretall, contestee, in which it is alleged that Henry W. Bretall has wholly abandoned said claim and has totally failed to reside upon the same for the past nine months; that said Henry W. Bretall has made no improvements of any character on said land and has failed to comply with the homestead laws of the United States in any particular; and that said alleged absence from said land was not due to his employment in the army, navy or marine Corps of the United States as a private soldier, officer, seaman or marine during the war with Spain or during any other war in which the United States may be engaged.

Said parties are hereby notified to appear, respond and offer evidence touching said allegation at 10 o'clock a. m., on June 22, 1904, before Vawter Crawford, County Clerk, at his office at Heppner, Oregon, and that final hearing will be held at 10 o'clock a. m., on June 28, 1904, before the Register and Receiver at the United States Land Office in LaGrande, Oregon.

The said contestant having, in a proper affidavit filed May 6, 1904, set forth facts which show that after due diligence personal service of this notice can not be made, it is hereby ordered and directed that such notice be given by due and proper publication.
