Local and Personal Happenings in and About the City.

Mrs. J. L. Hockett, of Portland, attended the memorial services here Tuesday.

There is now some talk of moving the machinery of the Heppner flouring mills to Ione.

Miss Edythe Hager of Heppner, is the guest of friends in the city.—Pendleton Tribune, Saturday.

Instead of the usual service at the Christian church on next Sunday evening, there will be a lecture on "The Genius and Individuality of the Y. P. S. C. E. Movement," by Rev. W. L. McIlvaine of Irrigon. Come and hear him. A cordial invitation is given to all.

The Umatilla Indians have been rounding up cayuses on the reservation during the past few days, and at the present time it is estimated that over 1500 animals have been driven in from different parts of the country, says the Pendleton Tribune. The Indians are busily engaged in branding their cayuses and segregating them into classified lots, preparatory to offering them for sale. It is understood that a large portion of the animals are affected with mange, and some are in a very bad condition. The govern-

ment officials will compel the Indians to corral the mangy cayuses and submit their animals to the dipping process before permitting them to leave the reservation.

Miss May Bailey, formerly of the Heppner public schools, who is now a resident of California, is visiting friends in Heppner.

Invitations are out announcing the commencement exercises of Saint Helen's Hall, Portland, on Wednesday, June 15. Miss Willetta Leezer, of Heppner, is a member of the graduating class.

Mrs. Henry Blackman left Saturday morning for Portland, to attend Grand Chapter Eastern Star as Matron of Ruth Chapter No. 32, Heppner. She will remain to see her son Leo graduate at the Portland High School on June 27th, when she will return home. She is accompanied by her husband, Henry Blackman, who will return today.

Dr. M. A. Leach, formerly of Portland, will locate in Heppner for the practice of dentistry. The doctor has rented rooms in the new Fair building which will be ready for occupancy about July 15. During the time that he is waiting for his offices to be furnished he will practice in Lexington. The doctor is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania.

Chas. Klein was severely injured Tuesday evening in a runaway accident. The accident occurred at the Hamilton place about 19 miles from Heppner. Mr. Klein was thrown out and badly bruised. He was brought to Heppner where he is confined to his room.

Mrs. E. M. Shutt and son Laurence returned Monday from St. Louis, Mo., where they have been for the treatment of Laurence's eyes. Dr. Green, the great oculist, who was treating the boy, is encouraged and thinks that with the proper glasses, which have been procured, will enable him to see and restore his sight so that he can get along fairly well. Dr. Green has recommended that Laurence be sent to the public schools.

Dan Stalter came in Sunday evening from the Mayflower mines in the Greenhorn mountains. Mr. Stalter with a force of three men, has been working the Oregon mine, which is located on the Illinois lead. Work will be confined to the Oregon this summer until this mine is opened up. Already they are opening up a very rich pay streak, and the ore will make a very high assay. Up to this time the miners have had much difficulty with snow causing a great amount of water in the tunnels. Quite a lot of wool is now coming in from the far interior points, to be in readiness for the next and last wool sales this season under the sealed bid method. The bulk of the wool to be marketed in Heppner has already been sold. Good prices are looked for at the coming sales which will be pulled off on June 23.
