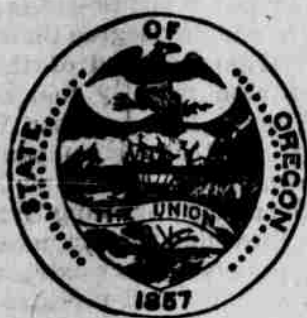

MEMORABLE CONVENTION

National Republican Delegates
Nominate Peerless Candidates.

ROOSEVELT AND FAIRBANKS

Wild Demonstration Follows Nom-
inating Speech Made by
Governor Black.

CHICAGO, June 23.—The demon-
stration that greeted the nomination of
President Roosevelt excelled anything
in the history of American conventions.
Governor Black pronounced the nomi-
nation words at just 11:06 o'clock. As
he did so he retired quickly from the
platform. But the words "Theodore
Roosevelt" had not left his lips when
there was a shout. The convention was
on its feet. Like the crash of thunder
that follows the lightning, the enthu-
siasm began. Flags were in the air,
hats were thrown up, men jumped onto
their chairs, women stood and shouted.
The air was rent with one continuous
prolonged shout from thousands of
throats. So mighty was the volume of
sound that nothing definite in the way
of articulate sound was distinguished.

At this point the band struck up. Its
strains, however, were only faintly dis-
cernable in the mighty din. Then,
Chairman Cannon took a hand. Un-
furling a tattered silk flag, he advanced
to the extreme edge of the platform and
began to wave it. The flag is the prop-
erty of the Lincoln-McKinley Associa-
tion of Missouri and it made its first ap-
pearance at a Republican National con-
vention in 1860, when Lincoln was nomi-
nated. It was then carried by the
Missouri delegation and was waved
over the platform on that occasion as on
this. It was fuel to the flame of en-
thusiasm and the volume of sound in-
creased.

The front of the platform was occu-
pied by an immense crayon portrait of
President Roosevelt, borne aloft by
three men. This gave fresh impetus to
the continuous shouting.

The front of the stage was next given
over to a young man with a megaphone
and a flag. As he swung the banner
from side to side he shouted the name
"Roosevelt." At each swing of the
flag the name was repeated. It was
soon taken up by the delegates in front
and spread to those in the rear, and in a
twinkle the whole assemblage was
shouting "Roosevelt," "Roosevelt."

After twenty minutes Chairman Can-
non tried to restore order, but was un-
able to do so for fully five minutes
more.

The roll call ended with no name
mentioned but that of Roosevelt, who
received a total of 994, the entire vote
of the convention.

The roll being called on nomination
for vice-president, all the states passed
for Iowa, when Senator Dolliver arose
to place Fairbanks of Indiana in nomi-
nation.

At 2:07 p. m. Fairbanks was nomi-
nated by acclamation. Depew asked for
a suspension of the roll call and nomi-
nation of Fairbanks by acclamation,
which was done.

The new republican national com-
mittee met immediately after adjourn-
ment and elected Cortelyou chairman.

Purse by Sheepmen.

Antelope, Or., June 23.—A meeting of
the Antelope Woolgrowers' Association,

with a large attendance of prominent
sheepmen, was held at this place Tues-
day for the purpose of discussing the
continued range troubles between sheep-
men and cattlemen. As a result of the
discussion a reward of \$500 was offered
by the local association in addition to
the \$1000 reward offered by the state as-
sociation, "for information leading to
the arrest and conviction of any person
or persons guilty of shooting, killing or
maiming any member of the above as-
sociation, or any employee of such mem-
ber, while engaged in their duties in at-
tendance on the herds of a member, or
guilty of killing, maiming or otherwise
unlawfully destroying the sheep of a
member."

A committee consisting of J. D. Mc-
Andie and H. C. Rooper, president and
secretary of the local association, and
Joseph Bannan, a prominent sheepman,
was also appointed to go to the scene of
the troubles in the Blue Mountains, for
the purpose of conferring with the
cattlemen with reference to making
lines for summer range.

The tone of the meeting was positive
and emphatic. The Woolgrowers' As-
sociation is determined that the slaugh-
ter of sheep shall stop, and each mem-

ber present today readily subscribed his
quota of the reward offered, which is
now in the hands of the treasurer of
the association.

Return of Captives.

Tangier, June 25.—Ion Perdicaris and
Cromwell Varley, who were captured
by bandits, have just arrived. Perdi-
caris is much fatigued after his long ride
but said he was glad to get back. He is
greatly pleased with the reception ac-
corded him by the townsmen who met
him in great numbers.

Perdicaris suffered many hardships
while in the hands of Raisuli, although
he said he did not think these were the
fault of the bandit chief and he had
every comfort under the circumstances.
Varley appeared to be as cheerful and
bright as if he had just returned from a
picnic. Both Perdicaris and Varley are
much thinner, especially the former,
who has aged considerably.
