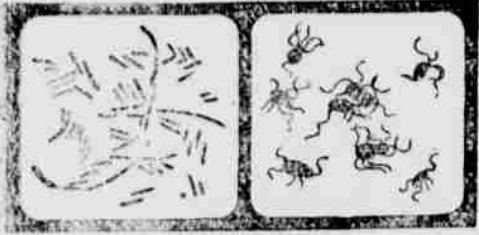


TYPHOID GERMS.

The bonds of the various county officers were accepted. Also the bonds of the Interior Warehouse Co., the Farmers Warehouse Co., and Kerr-Gifford Co and W P McMillan, warehousemen.

The fees for the county physician were fixed at \$2 50 for each visit to the poor farm, and \$1 00 per mile for each visit in the country.

The salaries of the deputy sheriff and deputy clerk were fixed at \$60 each per month, instead of \$50 and \$40 respectively, as heretofore.

The sum of \$100 was appropriated for the purpose of defraying the expense of collecting a Morrow county exhibit for Lewis and Clark Fair.

Dr. F. B. Kistner was appointed county physician for the remainder of the present year.

William J. Bryan states that his profits from the Commoner average about five thousand a year. His real and personal property is valued at between fifty and seventy-five thousand dollars.
