Bank of Heppner.

The Bank of Heppner opened its doors for the transaction of business yesterday. The new institution has very commodious and comfortable quarters in the Building and Loan Association building, corner of Main and Water streets. The Bank of Heppner has unusually sound financial backing, as a glance at their announcement on the fourth page of this issue will denote. The Heppner bank is really owned and managed by the same individuals as the Union Savings Bank of Walla Walla, an institution well known on this Coast. Mr. W. S. Wharton, the cashier, acted in the same capacity for the Walla Walla bank, and comes directly from that city.

Heppner and Morrow county is gratified by the installation of a second bank of the strength of this one. It denotes a healthy business activity and importance which we are to be excused from viewing with great complacency.

Ione Post.

District Attorney Phelps was a passenger to Pendleton Tuesday on official business. Mr. Phelps was the attorney employed by this city to negotiate for the sale of bonds to construct water works in Ione and in speaking of the matter Tuesday morning said it would be but a short time until there would be plenty of bond buyers in the field.

The citizens of Ione met last Saturday night and formed a Business Men's League, an organization to act upon any subject of interest to the public. The move was prompted by the newly or-

ganized Oregon Development League. Mayor Reid acted as chairman and appointed delegates to attend the convention of the state League in Portland.

The little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. F. Klitz met with an accident which resulted in a sad death on July 20th. While at play it came across a jar of gasoline and drank it, causing its death a few hours later. The child was 1 year, 8 months and 28 days old. Mr. and Mrs. Klitz live about six miles northeast of Ione and had the remains of their child interred in the Pettys cemetery. The family has the sympathy of all in their sad affliction.
