THE FAIR STORE

IT HAS BEEN ENLARGED AND REMODELED.

An Insight Into Modern Business Methods—The Art of Buying and Selling Up to Date.

The new Fair building is now completed and the great stock of this popular store has been rearranged in such a neat and attractive manner as to command attention and favorable comment.

The success and growth of this institution which is now in the front rank among the leading and largest stores of Eastern Oregon, is due to proper and careful business management.

The Fair was established by George White in August, 1899, who was succeeded by A. C. Giger in March, 1900. After the death of Mr. Giger who was drowned in the Heppner flood, the management was assumed by C. O. Huelat on the 10th of August of last year. To take charge of such large business interests, the attention of a competent and thorough business man was required. Since Mr. Huelat has been in charge, the increase of business and the success of the establishment tells the whole story as to the ability of the present manager. The mercantile business has been Mr. Huelat's life work and by long experience with some of the largest concerns he has acquired training that makes him well fitted for the responsibility of such an institution as The Fair. Mr. Huelat is a great believer in printer's ink and the inducements in trade are constantly before the public with attractive advertising, which accounts for the reason that The Fair is so well known, not only in Morrow county but far into the interior.

"The Place to Save Money," is the well known motto of The Fair. This is not a mere catch phrase, but is always backed up by the actual prices on goods marked in plain figures. The system and methods under which The Fair operates enables this store to sell cheaply.

There is nothing mysterious about it. It is simply the result of the proper handling of large capital. The Fair is one of a combination of 60 stores in the Northwest. This big combination is known as the Cash Buyers' Union. Naturally the 60 stores buy large quantities of goods. It is unnecessary to dwell upon the advantages to be derived by buying in large quantities for spot cash, and the discounting of bills. However, this is one of the reasons why The Fair can undersell the ordinary merchant. The Cash Buyers' Union practically controls the output of a number of the largest and best factories in the United States, an advantage which cannot be grasped by the merchants who buy individually and in comparatively small consignments.

Another big advantage is the fact that the 60 stores can afford to employ a New York buyer. J. D. Morton, 41 Mercer street, New York, is a regular salaried employe of this combination. Mr. Morton keeps thoroughly posted on the markets and being right on the ground is in close touch with every detail, thus having inside knowledge as to the proper times to make purchases which are beyond the reach of the ordinary buyer. Each store of the combination is notified of the purchases, and the different stores book their orders as to the quantity needed in their respective districts.

Another feature of the Fair method is the fact that no credit business is allowed. Everything is bought for cash, and marked in plain figures, and for everything that leaves the store, the cash must be paid for it. No profits are lost by bad debts, and the purchaser gets the entire benefit of the small margins.

Since the erection and completion of the new Fair building, a great amount of room and floor space has been added. To be in harmony with the new building, the old building has been repapered and decorated, and new fixtures have been added, while the store has been

thoroughly renovated, and the appearance presented is new and attractive. The main room of the old building is now the south wing of the big store, and with the change of shelving and addition of new fixtures together with the remodeling of the show windows has greatly changed the appearance of the interior. The new shelving together with the receptacles and annexes for the showing of goods make everything much handier for the people employed as well as being a great advantage in showing goods. In this room is the dry goods department including ladies' and children's ready made goods and shoes, with a fine display of millinery.

What is now termed the north wing is the new building. Upon entering this wing a noticeable and pleasing feature is the splendid light. With the big show windows in front and the row of windows along the side makes one of the best lighted stores in the country. In this room in speaking of the stock, a fitting term would be to say, everything for men. There is certainly an immense stock of fine new clothing. While the stock is large there is an unusual variety of up to date patterns and cuts to fit all sizes and tastes. On the south side of this room is the shoe store and the man who could not be suited there
