Army Officials to Offer a National Trophy and Medals to Soldiers.

irrangements Made to Have the First National Match Held Next September-Militiamen to Be Invited to Participate.

Unusual opportunities for the attainment of skill in marksmanship by the minufamen and others, as well as soldiers in the regular army, are offered in the rules governing the award of a cational trophy and medals which were approved to-day by Secretary Root. The first national match is to e shot September 8 and 9 at Scagirt. N. J., and the contest of next year will be held in the middle west. Among the regulations approved by the secretary are the following:

That the national guard and militia be invited to shoot in department competitions with the regular troops each year for he same prizes for which the regular army shoots, and that the national guard of the several states be permitted to use United States governmemnt ride ranges for target practice at such dates as may not interfere with their use by the army and marine corps. That every facility be offered citizens outside of the army and organized militia to become proficient in rifle shooting, and that this purpose can best be accomplished by means of rifle clubs.

The national shoot will be between teams of 12 men, representing each department of the army, the navy, the marine corps and the militia of each state. The prizes are:

1. The term making the highest aggregate total in two days' contest. "The National Trophy" cauthorized by congressed, to be connected for annually, \$1,000 and cash \$500.

2. The team making the second highest total, "The Holton Trophy" and

German Physician Declares That Encalyptus Fumes Will Destroy the Disease Germa.

A remedy claimed by its inventor as anentirely new treatment for consumption is attracting the attention of lung specialists at Berlin and the medical profession generally. It consists of the inhalation of vapor produced by heating a mixture of eucalyptus oil, sulphur and charcoal, and it is stated that it is more effective than any serum remedy hitherto tried.

Robert Schneider, a druggist, of Berlin, conceived the idea while travling in parts of Australia, where the suchlyptus tree grows luxuriantly. onsumption is almost unknown among the inhabitants of these districts and sufferers from the disease who go there improve speedily. Herr Schneider upon returning to Berlin communicated his idea to Dr. Sommerfeld, a physician of high repute, who experimented in hospitals for six months. As a result 60 of 100 patients treated by him were completely cured. The inhalation of the vapor kills the bacilli. In some cases the patients were kept in an atmosphere impregnated with the fumes night and day until they showed signs of relief. Dr. Sommerfeld will rend a paper on the subject before the Berlin Medical society at the end of April, claiming that the new curriive agent, which is called Sanosia, constitutes an enormous advance in the treatment of tuberculosis.
