Fossil Journal.

The O. R. & N. has announced that it will have a railroad built from Arlington to Condon this fall, by an independent company working in harmony with the Harriman interests. The road will be built this fall if the other companies in the field, combined with the portage railway agitation, proves strong enough to force the O. R. & N. to build it in order to retain a valuable and rapidly-increasing traffic. Coming as it

does on the eve of the Development League's ringing resolutions for the portage railroad, Mr. Calvin's announcement does not enthrall as it might under other circumstances, and the Condon farmer who depends on getting his wheat to Arlington this year by rail is depending in all probability upon a broken reed. Meantime our advice to the farmers of Gilliam and southern Wheeler counties is this: Rest not on your oars, but keep pegging away for the portage road, and the Gilliam county branch will soon come, and that too without any bowing and scraping to the railroad magnates who have all too long pursued their dog in the manger policy of bottling up this Inland Empire of vast and varied possibilities.

Condon Times.

Cline Falls is the name of a new town that has been platted on the Des Chutes river 22 miles east of Prineville. The town is located in the fertile region that is soon to be brought under cultivation by irrigation. The new town is well located and has everything in its favor to make it a lively and thrifty burg. J. E. Lancaster is interested in the development of the new town.

The body of Fred Dee was taken from the grave at Arlington last Saturday morning. Dee was a Klickitat

sheepman whose life was heavily insured and whose death occurred on the 12th of last April under suspicious circumstances. It is reported by some that he was poisoned and in order to ascertain the facts in the case the body was exhumed by Sheriff Van Vactor and District Attorney Ward. The remains were sent to Portland to determine by analysis whether Dee died from slow strychnine poisoning or not. The results will not be known for three or four weeks. The alleged disagreement between the Arlington doctors did not occur prior to or over the death of Dee, but is of recent occurrence.

WHEAT UP PAST \$1.17.

May Option in New York Higher Even than in Chicago.

New York, Aug. 20.—New high records were made in the wheat market today when May wheat sold here at \$1.17½ and in Chicago at \$1.16¼. This represented an advance of a cent and a half over the highest previous prices, and 2½ cents over the closing level of last night. The advance has been one of the most sensational in the history of wheat speculation, as May wheat sold at \$2 less than two months ago and the rise of 34 cents at harvest time is seldom seen in the wheat trade.

There was heavy profit-taking on the advance, as well as short covering. Bears have been punished severely for two months and have attempted to catch the top ever since wheat crossed the dollar mark. But each rise has carried the prices higher than before, and shorts have been compelled to cover at enormous losses. There was heavy selling yesterday and shorts ran this morning. The market was active and excited, with trade along heavy lines. Reports of damage from the Canadian wheat country, as well as from Minnesota, continue to be the features. This kept the wheat market boiling here and at Chicago.

Claim the Czarina Gave Birth to a Girl.

New York, Aug. 20.—A cable to the World from Paris says: The Russian revolutionists here declare positively that the Empress of Russia really gave birth to a female child for whom a male child was substituted. The substitute is a peasant woman's baby.

The revolutionists vouch for the truth of the statement, and astonishing as it is they insist that it comes from a reliable source and will be verified later. The Nihilists say that the internal condition in Russia is such that had the people been disappointed again in the hope of the birth of a czarowitch, a revolt was imminent.

This danger, magnified by the probability of the early fall of Port Arthur, caused the czar's advisers to take the remarkable precaution of providing a substitute.
